Grand Jury's Report. Condition of Jail and Court House and Other Matters.

The Grand Jury, through Jona Han White, Foreman, made the following report to Judge Timberlake on Saturday:

We have passed on all papers sent to us.

We have examined the jail and found it in a good condition as the crowded condition will admit. There was no complaint as to food and treatment by the prisoners.

We find that the Court House has been repaired, painted, etc., and is now in a good condition. We recommend that some seats be placed in the passage near the Grand Jury room for the comfort of witnesses.

We believe that all the officers of the county have performed their duties faithfully.

We recommend that Joan Collins be sent to some place that will keep him off the public highway, but re some one will get into trouble with or by him.

A committee of our body has been to the home of the aged and infirm. We find that the buildings are in good condition, rooms are all clean, bedding clean. We hear no complaint from the inmates. We recommend that the Superintendent give them more of his attention.

Called Home by Sickness. Presiding Elder B. R. H. H. was prevented from filling the appointment made for him for Sunday in the Methodist church. After arriving here Saturday night he received a telegram advising him of the serious sickness of a son and he left early Sunday morning for Fayetteville.

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## W. B. QUINERLY ACQUITTED.

Solicitor Withdraws Prosecution, the Court Orders a Verdict of Not Guilty.

W. B. Quinerly, who in February had stabbed and killed Levi Langley, was acquitted by the Superior Court Thursday morning on the charge of manslaughter.

The jury was empanelled and after the examination of the witnesses the Solicitor withdrew the case. The defense attorneys on the stand, one of whom being the defendant's counsel, and the other the State's.

At the close of the evidence the Solicitor withdrew the case as strongly as he could, and in the face of the testimony that had been introduced it would be an injustice to a citizen and to the State to undertake to press the matter and withdraw the prosecution.

Judge Timberlake at once ordered the clerk to enter a verdict of not guilty.

The entire testimony showed conclusively that Mr. Quinerly acted properly in self defense, Langley having pursued him for some distance and being in the act of assaulting him at the time he struck the fatal stab.

The defendant was represented by Messrs. Bond & Fleming and T. G. James.
