Antioxine for Swine. Dr. Salmon chief of the Bureau of Animal Industry, has submitted to Secretary Wilson a report upon the experiments made in the treatment of hog cholera with antioxine. The results are a Washington Dispatch in the New York Sun. This serum is made upon the same principle as the antioxin of diphtheria, and is obtained from both horses and cattle which have been inoculated with the hog cholera virus. The blood of such animals, when injected under the skin of swine, produces both preventive and curative effects.

Fire Insurance Rates Should Decrease. The present year will no doubt see a still greater downward tendency in insurance rates. Statistics of fire losses in the United States during the past year show an aggregate of \$110,000,000, being \$50,000,000 less than in 1937. So marked a decrease in losses is not so much attributable to good luck, as to improved methods of instruction, vigilance of inspection, and greater efficiency of the fire services. All of these most directly affect the rates charged for insurances, and by a lowering of them, they can enable property owners to carry greater protection than they have heretofore done.

Migration of Cotton-Spinning. A few figures along the way. The World by the Governor of North Carolina illustrates the industry of cotton spinning and weaving is migrating from New England to the South. **WATCHING EMPLOYEES.**

New financial institutions and others here in New York City.

It has become the custom elsewhere, and it is generally true in this city, that the employees in financial institutions are required to give bond, the amounts varying with the degree of responsibility of the duties which they perform. In addition to this, however, a supervision, varying in method, is maintained over each employee.

It is believed that the cultivation of expensive habits, the contracting of debts which indicate that the employees are living beyond their salaries, and the association with undesirable characters all may be looked upon as furnishing ground for suspicion that, if the employee has not actually committed a breach of trust, he is in a fair way to meet some attempt which may prove too much for him.

It is therefore not unusual for an employer in such an institution to receive a summons to appear before the controlling official, and kindly, but firmly, to give evidence to change his course of life or to leave the institution.

It is also felt by those who are interested in the management of such institutions that the confidence of the public is apt to be impaired when they know that men of bad habits and those keeping improper company are employed in it. It is therefore on this ground, as well as for the better security of the funds which are entrusted to their keeping, that financial institutions are in the habit of keeping such a close watch over the daily lives of their employees.

In the case of mercantile establishments, both large and small, in this city, it is not the custom to require bonds of employees except in the cases of a few. Nevertheless, the proprietors of such establishments find it necessary to guard against the possibility of the dishonesty of employees, and it is stated that one of the best methods known to modern business men of that nature is the institute and the way of living of the employees.

In all large establishments there are certain number of employees who enjoy considerable positions. They are supposed to keep the members of the firm posted in regard to what is going on among the forces of employees, and they, in turn, are inspected by the members of the firm. It is a matter of everyday occurrence that the largest of large establishments is notified, that some employee has made some purchase or made some other act, perhaps of a small nature, which seems to be an indication of extravagance.

**Slavery Under the Stars and Stripes**

The large Chinese settlement in San Francisco has made traffic in human beings not possible, but a business followed as a means of profit in the States, and under the protection and patronage of two Chinese societies, and here, in the heart of an American city, we find one of the best organized slave marts of modern times, fostered by as active a band of criminals as could be produced in any portion of the uncivilized world's land numbering at least three thousand, who derive their support, directly or indirectly, from the sale and traffic of female slaves.

The Chinese population of San Francisco is estimated at 200,000. Of these 2,000 Chinese are merchants, 4,000 are domestic servants, 3,000 are the criminals referred to, and 3,000 are women and children. Of the 2,000 females it is estimated that 1,000 are legitimate wives, the remaining 1,000 being slaves in the fullest sense of the word. In their traffics in the Orient, brought to America by fraud and imposture passed through the custom house under false titles, in fear of death or other consequences, put up at auction before professional slave merchants, knocked down to the highest bidder, and consigned, in the majority of instances, to a life under dress in the Chinese brothels of an American city.

A young Chinese girl from 10 to 12 years of age in San Francisco today has a market value of from \$100 to \$200. A girl valued at \$15, if attractive, is quoted on exchange among the brothel-keepers, who estimate the brokers in this unique American exchange, at from \$500 to \$1,000, while for girls over 15 years of age the price ranges up to \$3,000, which has been paid on the very good ground that such an investment will return a profit of 20 to 30 per cent.—Charles Frederick Holder, in American Review.

How do You Walk?
