OUR TELEGRAPH SERVICE.
For nearly three months THE REFLECTOR has been giving its readers a daily telegraphic service, furnishing the news every day just as it occurred. This has been done at great expense to the paper and much extra labor to the editor and force. We doubt if another editor in the State, or elsewhere, has done the same amount of work that we have had to do to furnish such news. The editor of THE REFLECTOR has served as his own telegraph operator, receiving all the press despatches himself and editing them in readiness for the printers, besides looking after his local reporting and office duties. No one unacquainted with it can realize what taxing, almost killing work this has been.
Of course giving this telegraphic news has to some extent increased the patronage of the paper, but not enough to justify the extra expense incurred to see nothing of the increase. Labor. Every week the service has been given we have lost money by it. Besides this, for sometime now the news has been such a nature as to not be worth paying for. Such as could not be vouched for, the news associations in order to fill out their contract to the required number of words having taken to the habit of sending out runners one day and correcting them the next. This has been both annoying and unsatisfactory, in that readers of such news could not know at the time of reading if it was true.
Another trouble has been the delay on the part of the telegraph people in getting the service to us, making it very late in the afternoon before we could get THE REFLECTOR out.
For all these reasons taken together we have decided to stop the telegraphic service for awhile, both to save the expense while the news is not worth paying for, and to take some rest that we sorely need. Our readers can rest assured that we will closely watch what is going on and THE REFLECTOR will keep them informed of all important occurrences connected with the war. And just as soon as the news becomes of sufficient interest we will begin the regular telegraphic service again. We are not stopping it permanently, but only temporarily.
With this explanation we hope no one who has subscribed to THE REFLECTOR because of the telegraphic service will withdraw his name. By continuing your patronage you will help us to some extent regain what we have lost in giving the service so far, and it will show that you appreciate what we have already done. Bear in mind that THE REFLECTOR is going to keep you up with the news.

SPAIN PROTESTS
Victoria, B. C., June 19.—The following was received today per steamer Nihoa from Honolulu June 9th:
The following is the full text of the correspondence between the Spanish Consul at this port and the Hawaiian government, relating to the entertainment of American troops at this port:
Honolulu, June 1.
"H. E. Cooper, Minister of Foreign Affairs."
"Sir: In my capacity as vice consul for Spain, I have the honor today to enter formal protest to the Hawaiian government against the constant violation of neutrality in this harbor, which is a constant violation of the laws of the United States of America. Requesting you to acknowledge the receipt of this communication, I have the honor to be, Sir,
Vice Consul for Spain."
The reply of the government, which is now in Mr. Boyd's hands is as follows:
"Department of Foreign Affairs, Honolulu, June 6, 1898.
"Sir: In reply to your note of the 1st instant, I have the honor to say this owing to the intimate relations existing between this country and the United States, this government has not proclaimed a proclamation of neutrality having reference to the present conflict between the United States and Spain, but, on the contrary, has tendered to the United States the privilege and assistance, for which reason your protest can receive no further consideration than to acknowledge its receipt."
