Gen. Wheeler's on Hand. Camp Wicket, Montauk Point, Sept. 7.—Thomas H. Wheeler, Second Lieutenant Newton D. Kirkpatrick, First Cavalry, were drowned this afternoon. Young Wheeler was a naval cadet in his second year. He had been acting on his father's staff for some time past. He was 17 years of age, was a fine young fellow and had made a host of friends among the officers. Kirkpatrick he went to the beach this afternoon, to enjoy the surf bathing. The surf ran high and the undertow was very strong. Apparently no one saw the young man until about 6 o'clock that he was missed. Their clothes were found a short distance from General Wheeler's tent. It is believed that the young officers were swept away by the strong seas. Tonight a detail of 60 men from the First Cavalry is stationed along the coast to watch for the bodies that may be thrown up on shore.
