WASHINGTON LETTER. From our regular Correspondent. WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18. It is known that Mr. McKinley feels very keenly the reluctance manifested by the voters of the country at the Congressional election, and probably if he had it all to do over again, he would not be willing to take the responsibility of the first Cabinet meeting after the election was a very successful one. It is believed that Mr. McKinley will do his utmost to protect them, and in case of their inability to do so, that they will be reinforced by Federal troops. Some of the men ordered out of their States, among them a white southerner from South Carolina, who is in Washington, trying to persuade Mr. McKinley to get mixed up in their quarrel, and every one of them would gladly compromise by accepting an appointment in Washington. There may be Democrats who are discontent over the result of the election, but if they have not been seen. All those who are talking on the subject express the opinion that the party made a splendid showing, and that reducing the Republican majority in the House almost to the vanishing point, will be compared with that of 1896. It will be seen that this week's election was a great triumph for the Democratic party. It was a victory in the face of the obstacles which confronted the party. It is an incredible feat that an administration which had the undivided support of the country in fighting a triumph close a year ago, and lost so much of that support, although all sorts of opposition, ranging from patriotism to expediency, were used to retain it. If the Democratic party maintains its present aggressive attitude, it will surely win the Presidential election in two years hence.

Senator Jones, of Ark., chairman of the Democratic National Committee, does not regard the election of Roosevelt a serious peril to the Democracy of the country. On the contrary, he talks as though he believed it would be decidedly beneficial. He says the Democratic leaders in New York were astray on the party platform and that the defeat of the party in that State as the result of the election of Roosevelt and piece-meal politicians.
