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

AMERICAN USE OF NICKEL & A BALLOON RAILROAD.

A Metal Which is Going to Be Larger
Demand Than Heretofore.

The average production of nickel into the United States has amounted to more than two million pounds a year, and the value of such imports, chiefly from New Caledonia and Canada, is \$900,000 a year. Last year nickel was shipped to the amount of \$1,200,000, and the amount of \$800,000 was produced in Canada. These two countries supply practically all the nickel in the world, and the United States uses about one-third of the whole world's supply.

Nickel is a white metal of peculiar hardness, and is used in the brass, copper and silver. Its extension in use has, however, been to some extent retarded of late years by the greater cheapness of aluminum, which is a lighter metal, quite as malleable, bright sheen which makes nickel plating so attractive an ornament, and which relieves it from the dullness to which it is subject.

The American "sheet piece" or "nickel" is three-fourths copper and one-fourth nickel. It was first produced by Germany in 1860.

The rock on the car tank of

Guy Jarvis at Murfreesboro.

Our townshain ex-gov. T. J. Jarvis, delivered the commencement address in the Chowan Baptist Female Institute, Murfreesboro, last Wednesday. Speaking of it the Murfreesboro Index says:

The address delivered by Gov. Jarvis to "The Republic's need of an educated womanhood," was sound, practical and uplifting. The speaker recognized the dangers threatening our republican but did not regard them from a pessimistic standpoint. If there are real dangers already appearing as a menace to our nation, they are seen coming not from without but from within. We have nothing to fear from attack by a foreign foe, since the opportunity never fails to develop here a Grand, a carnal gut or a boney. If it should come to our republic, it must come through the disintegration of our social institutions.

The speaker remarked that he never had any sympathy for the idea of woman's suffrage, since he has never believed her place to be at the ballot box, nor is it her privilege to have recourse with the sternness to the awful arbitrament of war. He believed woman's power should be exerted in the home where she is the unsworn queen. In the church she should surely, surely the sons will be given the true womanhood educated in heart and heart and I don't care who makes the laws of the country. Sometimes we have instances of strong men coming from rough and undignified houses, while we see men now wicked who were carefully trained in pious homes, but such instances show the exception and not the rule. Woman's power is exerted in behalf of a safe and healthy conservatism and other strong convictions of God and of God's law.


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
