WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 11, '09. "Evidently the war in the Philippines speedily, or the result will be disastrous to you and to the Republic party." That is the sum and substance of what is being daily flung into the ears of Mr. McKinley, not by his opponents, but by leading Republicans, who know how unpopular that war is becoming all over the country. Mr. McKinley is gradually becoming convinced that the reaction in public sentiment concerning his Philippine policy, predicted more than a year ago by Col. Bryan, is at hand, and one fully convinced, there is no telling what he may do for this country has never had a President who feared the public sentiment of the country as much as Mr. McKinley does, or who tried so hard to make his official acts meet its approval, regardless of his own opinion.

The most striking thing connected with the hearing on trusts, by the Industrial Commission, was a biting and somewhat scandalous attack upon Vice Chairman Phillips of the Commission, who is connected with an independent oil company Pennsylvania, by officials of the Standard Oil Trust. Mr. Phillips denied the charge that he had been mixed up in an offer to dicker with the Standard Oil Trust, but the charge left a bad taste in everybody's mouth, and is not calculated to add anything to the prestige of the Commission, which isn't any too great at best.

Consumption Overtakes Production

The year 1899 must be set down as a phenomenal one in the varied extent of immensity of the development going on.

This development and prosperity is not limited, it is world wide. Wars or rumors of troubles of any kind have had no effect in checking the prosperity.

The wave of prosperity in the United States was on when the Spanish war came, but it was not checked in the least, and has the effect to magnify the Philippines troubles retarded the tremendous business activity of the country.

England's threatened trouble with the Transvaal has not hindered the rush of trade in the British Isles, or impeded India's prosperity. Throughout Africa there is a rush of commerce, while China, Japan and the Orient are exerting themselves to keep up in the prosperous procession.

The old complaint of "over production" is not heard in these days, instead consumers have to check themselves. Great industrial plants have had to shut down because of too much work, and too little material. Contractors with government contracts have had to stop, because of the scarcity of material, and when every plant possible has been run day and night to produce material for consumption.

Shortage of copper has checked the electrical industry, aluminum being substituted as far as possible to make up the deficiency. New and projected railroad enterprises have been stopped because of shortage and the impossibility to procure materials for construction.

The cry of over production a few years ago, gave the politicians the opportunity to argue that the country's monetary system was wrong, free trade, or protection were to blame.

And yet the financial system is the same, the tariff is unchanged, and the fact remains that while production has increased immensely yet consumption has out distanced it.

And through it all the city, section or State which has not, and is not gaining during this season of prosperity is radically wrong in some way.—New Bern Journal.

Probably 40,000 Negroes Can

Charman Simmons thinks that between 25,000 and 30,000 colored men in the State can vote under the proposed amendment. We would suppose at least that number can vote if the amendment should pass, as it will. After 20-odd years of public schooling, at the expense of the whites, there ought to be nearer 10,000 who can vote, being able to read and write. The whites have expended no less than \$8,000,000—probably \$10,000,000—of their own money to qualify negroes to read and write. We give this from the wide-awake Democratic chairman.

It is estimated that between 25,000 and 30,000 negroes in the State can now comply with the test. There are probably in the State 400 or three thousand negro voters who are illiterate descendants of what

A Free Trip to Paris!

Washington, D. C., Sept. 18, 1899. The Postoffice department at Washington has ruled that the writer has a right to regain the possession of a letter providing he can prove to the satisfaction of the postmaster and the office from which the letter was sent that he was the writer of it. Even if the letter has arrived at its destination and before it has been delivered to the person to whom it was addressed, it may be recalled by telegram through the mailing office. The reason assigned is that the United States is only the agent of the writer while the letter is in transit. The decision is important to business men and to private individuals.

WASHINGTON LETTER. Washington, D. C., Sept. 18, 1899. The capitalists who were trying to get Mr. McKinley to mix this government up in the affairs of Santo Domingo have withdrawn the pressure, because they now believe that their man, Jiminez, who is already at the head of the provisional government, will be peacefully elected President by the people of Santo Domingo, and their business interests over there will be taken care of by him, without the direct assistance of this government. Private advices from Santo Domingo say that U. S. consular officials are quietly aiding Jiminez all they can. If that be true, they have received a tip from Washington, as otherwise they would not dare to do such a thing. The sudden discovery, by the administration, that Porto Rico needs a civil government and the announcement that it is to be given one in advance of Congressional action, is intended more to delay the establishment of a permanent government on the island by Congress than for the benefit of the Porto Ricans. Inasmuch as the proposed civil government is to be entirely appointive from the top to the bottom, and that its every act must be approved in Washington before becoming effective, it is a rather wide stretch of the imagination to call it "home rule" for Porto Rico, as the administration shouters are doing. A Republican Senator who is classed as an administration man, although his friends know that he's rather inclined to oppose than to support anything leading towards imperialism, said of this new Porto Rican scheme, "I believe that it is the first step towards influencing Congress to de-

WASHINGTON LETTER. Washington, D. C., Sept. 18, 1899. The panic of the administration over the situation in Ohio, daily grows worse, and Mr. McKinley tells the Ohio Republicans who call on him that the state must be carried at all hazards. He sent a trusted personal messenger to New York to meet Boss Hanna when he arrived from Europe and tell him just how blue things look from the administration point of view; also to impress upon him the necessity of taking steps to see that plenty of money was provided for use in Ohio. It is probably the taking of these steps which caused Boss Hanna to stop in New York, instead of coming direct to Washington. The matter has been discussed in Cabinet meetings and two members, Postmaster General Smith and Secretary Wilson designated to take the stump. Mr. Wilson will speak mostly in the agricultural section, his powers of persuasion among farmers being supposed to be wonderful, while Mr. Smith will talk mostly to city and town audiences. The ordering of the Civilian Philippine Commissioners home was also influenced to a certain extent, by the Ohio scare. It is hoped to have the next fighting campaign under way before election day, and the civilian Commissioners are gotten out of the way so that Orstein have no excuse for not pushing the fighting. So much for the Republican view of the Ohio campaign.

The Trunkers to Organize. Mr. J. Bryan Grimes, member of the State Board of Agriculture and President of the Washington Farmers' and Trunkers' Association, has written to Commissioner Patterson suggesting that a meeting of the fruit and truck growers of the State be held at Raleigh for the purpose of organizing a permanent association. Mr. Grimes says "he has information that the East Carolina Fruit and Truck Growers' Association shows signs of disintegration."
