Our royally inclined President has become so sensitive relative to his doings that any criticism on the part of a poor government clerk brings down the Administration wrath to the point of dismissal. Noble E. Dawson, a clerk in the War Department, has been removed for criticizing the President. Evidently free speech is restricted not only in Russia and in China, but in the United States as well.

The trusts are an issue that the Republicans do not care to have brought prominently to the front in next year's campaign. To show the extent to which these monopolies created to enrich the stockholders at the expense of the people at large, have been nourished under that great humping, the protective tariff, should be the aim of every Democratic editor and speaker in next year's struggle. Mark Hanna to the contrary notwithstanding, there are trusts and very big ones at that.
