Referring to the much desired presentation of the state's resources at the St. Louis exposition, the esteemed New Era Journal does us justice in saying that THE REFLECTOR's record does not show that we believe in quitting. This subject is one that is close to the heart of every North Carolina newspaper man who loves his country. It is doubtful if any one else of people appreciate the value of advertising as does the newspaper makers, many of whom have studied advertising all their lives. Many men believe that advertising pays, but newspaper men know it.

The Journal gets at the bottom of the matter in the following eminently sensible remarks: "The legislature's failure to provide an ample fund for a North Carolina exhibit at the St. Louis Exposition, was weakness, a short sightedness, which in a business house would have been a distinct setback in its management and probably injury to its trade. "While there is no real analogy, yet it could not be said that credit is injured, at least there is a demand to purchase its bonds, when those who seek to sell its bonds refuse to advertise its resources and show its products to the world that is seeking investment."

Let the merchant keep his store filled with the choicest articles, yet if he does not make known what he has, there will be no demand or sale of his goods. Let the matter be thoroughly discussed and advertised before the coming meeting of the North Carolina Press Association at Wrightsville, North Carolina, even so small amount of its present prosperity to the patriotic and unselfish efforts of its public journals, and they will gladly take up this new burden. North Carolina MUST be represented. That is the cry. Take it up and sound it from Mantoo to Murphy.
