NATIONAL INCONSISTENCIES.

Russia and other European countries are preparing for the wholesale expulsion of Mormons. We are nonholder of the tyranny of European despots, but we think it is long past the time when this country should have shut its gates to the world's human garbage. NEW CONSTITUTIONS. TALK.

The Supreme court of the United States has decided, practically, that the new constitutions of Southern states are to stand. The case before the Supreme court was the suit of a negro named Giles to compel the registrars of Montgomery county, Ala., to place his name, and the names of 5,000 other negroes, upon the registration. It was first tried in the Federal court for the district of Alabama, this court deciding that it did not have jurisdiction, and upon the question of jurisdiction the case was brought before the supreme court by appeal and certiorari.

The Wilmington Messengers say: The announcement of the state department that it is ready to furnish riot cartridges to the national state guard causes much comment in the press. Does the government expect to use the state guard as a national police to suppress riots is the question some are asking. The Messenger will remember that we practically asked that question some months ago, at which time The Messenger commented that there was no harm in the new militia law. In our seaside contemporary still willing to submit to the officers' opinions! Have the protests of the militia of New York, Virginia and other states shown The Messenger a new light?

The Texas law looking to greater accuracy of statistics of the cotton crop is a good and wise measure and should be adopted by all cotton raising states. It makes it obligatory on the manager of each gin in the state on the first of September of each year to make a report of his county judge of the number of bales of cotton he has ginned since May 1st, and thereafter until May 1st, he shall make a report for each previous month of the number of bales ginned. He shall also make with each monthly report an estimate of the percentage of cotton in his territory that has been ginned and of that which is yet to be ginned.

"Judge Gooch in Chicago rejected a number of leading railroad from discriminating against small shippers. It is remarkable how difficult it is to prevent the strong from imposing on the weak," says the Greensboro Telegram.
