The Dead at Heppner.


Heppner, Ore., June 17.-The confusion has been so great here that no accurate estimate of the number of lives lost by the flood could be made. Last night 130 bodies had been recovered. It is believed that the number of dead will not exceed 200. Martial law prevails here while the work of rescuing the bodies continues.

Free lunches have been estab lished. Provisions are arriving from all towns. A second specia train with provisions and \$7,000 cash, raised by Portland yesterday, reached the Lexington end of the railroad and is being forwarded by team. Ghouls are looting the bodies still in the wreckage.
