





Roanoke Frend to Hang March 18th.

Henry Williams, the burly negro, who at noon on January 30th, last entered the home of George J. Shields, in Roanoke, Va., and assulted Mrs. Shields and her three year-old daughter with a hatchet, razar and pocket knife and left them for dead, was tried Tnesday and sentenced to hang on march 18.

After hacking and fracturing the skulls of his victims with a hatchet, Williams cut Mrs. Shields throat from ear to ear and locked her in a clothes closet. He then e-caped to the coal fields where he was captured last Wednesday. He confessed the crime and on Friday was rushed across the State of Virginia on a special train to Richmond for safe keeping. He was brought to Roanoke Tuesday on a special train, accomparied by 500 Richmond soldiers and another special train bearing 800 soldiers. He was hurried to the court house under the protection of eighteen companies of state militia and was tried on the charge of felonians assault.


