Sometimes a man may not be prepared to pay - may not have the money. But if those who could just as well pay as not would volunteer their payments, or even facilitate the collector's work, it would help those whose business often needs the money due. *Charlotte Chronicle.*

It has for many years been more or less the fashion for our manufacturers to chime in with northern high protection interests, and declare that a high protective tariff is beneficial to them. It is true that this view was presented largely in connection with the sound money arguments which appealed to the business judgment of bankers and financiers all over the country, and in that way goldbugism and high protection became twin sisters. Now that the financial question is settled, and settled right, southern business men and manufacturers are beginning to take an independent view of the tariff question just as they did twenty years ago with the same result. They find that the present high tariff is only a burden of monopoly for the immensely large capitalized concerns at the expense of the smaller independent ones. *Greensboro Record.*

It was a boll of cotton from which the bloom was about to shed and ravages of the boll weevil were plainly evident. The bloom was cut to pieces very much after the order of the corn worm and the small boll was affected also. Mr. Thorne discovered the weevil in the bloom and says his whole crop is similarly affected. He has six acres in which he calculated on getting four bales of cotton, but he says he will now be satisfied if he gets one. A neighbor's crop adjoining is also infested with the boll weevil. *Henderson Gold Leaf.*

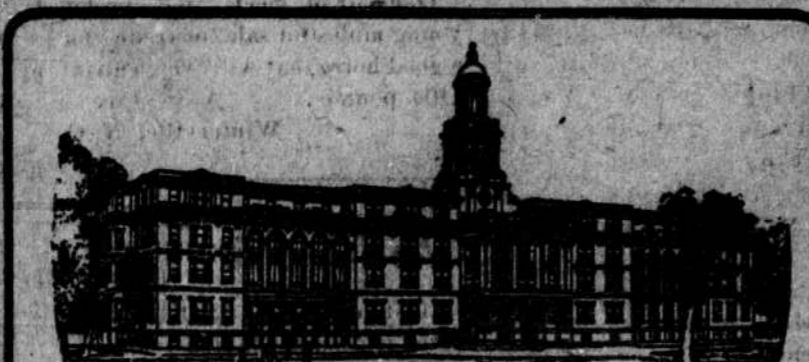
