The temperance sentiment, thank God, is dominant in North Carolina. That was very clearly shown at Greensboro, and the triumph at Charlotte emphasizes the power and effectiveness of the movement. But the victory is not yet won by any means. The liquor men are astute and wily and their long and successful experience in politics gives them a wonderful advantage. They know the importance of attending the primaries and selecting delegates friendly to their interests. Our people are not so well up on this game. If we are not awake and alert the liquor people will win the Legislature and neutralize the legislation that has been so hardly wrong from our law-makers. The matter of supreme importance now before us is to see that men are nominated who will faithfully carry out the will of the moral element of North Carolina. No matter how strong the pressure brought to bear, if our people will let it be clearly and fully understood that they will positively not vote for a man who is not an outspoken and avowed advocate of temperance legislation, the other sort will not be nominated, for the slate-makers have their ears to the ground and they will see that the men the people want will be nominated. The politicians are perfectly willing to give us the right sort of men as representatives, if we only demand them, and we must demand them. The fate of the temperance cause is now in the hands of the citizens. What are we going to do about it? —Thomasville Charty and Children
