FIRE NEAR ALWOOD.

Thought to Have Been Caused By Passing Locomotive. B. M. Whitehurst, a member of the county board of education and who lives near Alwood, suffered a serious loss by fire Friday afternoon. The fire occurred about 2 o'clock and destroyed a pack house, barn, stables, shelter, smoke house, a lot of corn, fodder, peanuts, peas, fertilizers, a buggy and quantity of building material. Mr. Whitehurst says the fire started in a stack of fodder near the stables, and a high wind blowing at the time caused it to spread rapidly among the buildings. His dwelling house had a narrow escape and was saved only by hard work. The loss is estimated at \$800 to \$1,000 and he had only \$185 insurance. Mr. Whitehurst says he is confident the fire originated from sparks from an engine on the railroad. The railroad is about 200 yards from where the fire occurred and the south bound freight train had just passed when the stack of fodder was discovered burning on top. This was direct to windward from the railroad and a fence was set on fire at the same time at a point nearer the railroad. This morning about sunrise a colored neighbor, T. W. C. Moore, drove up to Mr. Whitehurst's gate with a load of corn to help him that much on his loss, an act which Mr. Whitehurst says he appreciates very highly.

A BOLD INTRUDER

The House of James Brown Entered. About 11 o'clock, Wednesday night, after the family had retired, a man was discovered in the home of James Brown, on Dickens avenue. Mr. Brown's oldest daughter, Miss Ellie, aged about 12 years, and her little brother Bert, aged about 6, occupied a room together on the second floor. Miss Ellie noticed the door of her room open slightly and got up and closed it, thinking nothing unusual of it at the time. A little later the door opened again, wider than before, and as she was again going towards it she saw a man standing in the door. This greatly frightened her and she became screaming. In her fright she only noticed that the man had on a sweater. Mr. Brown hearing the screams of his daughter rushed up to her room and took her in his arms to quiet her. Dr. McG. Earnl, who occupies a room on the first floor, heard a sound like some one running across the roof of the back porch near his room. He hurried out to the porch and was just in time to see a man catch on the roof of the dining room and disappear over it. The man evidently feared detection if he came to the ground from the porch, therefore he sprang across an alley, about 5 feet, between the porch and the dining room, went from the roof of the dining room to the roof of the kitchen, then on to the roof of the milk house from which he jumped to the ground and made his escape. The intruder was evidently some one who was familiar with the premises. An examination showed that he had gone from the door of the children's room through the company room on opposite side of the hall and from this room went out a window on the porch. The bed in the company room also showed that some one had been sitting on it, which indicated that the man had entered the house sometime earlier before the doors were fastened, and had waited in this room for the family to retire.

Annual Meeting of Stockholders—The Company is Progressive. Condition. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Farmers Consolidated Tobacco Company was held in the Farmers warehouse on Friday, 18th. The company paid a dividend of 15 1/2 percent, which in view of the very short crop is a most remarkably creditable showing. As we have before stated, it seems to us that this company bids fair to become one of the strongest business organizations in the county. And why? What is to prevent it from being a giant in the tobacco world? The farmers who make the tobacco are the owners of the company, and if they will pull together and support and personize their own business, with business men who understand thoroughly the management of the business in charge, there is no other business in our knowledge that will equal it as a money maker. The company was organized in October, 1903, and it has already paid 49 1/2 percent dividends on the original stock. This, too, in the face of the most energetic opposition. Owing to the increased business the combined office of secretary and treasurer which has heretofore been filled by W. H. Dail, Jr., was abolished and the separate offices of auditor and treasurer were created. W. H. Dail, Jr., was elected auditor and R. J. Cobb was elected treasurer. O. L. Alfred Augustus Watson, bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church of the East Carolina Diocese, died at his home in this city at 3:25 p. m. today after an illness of nearly two years following a stroke of paralysis. The end came peacefully after a period of unconsciousness of several hours. He was 86 years old. Reports say that truck crops around New Bern were damaged about fifty percent by the recent freeze. Around Wilmington the estimates run from sixteen to sixty percent.

A THREAT TO KILL SAM JONES

Noted Evangelist Rescued From an Unpleasant Situation by a Call to the Telephone. Montgomery, Ala., April 20.—Rev. Sam P. Jones, Cartersville, Ga., the well known evangelist and lecturer, had an unusual experience here today with another minister who threatened his life. Mr. Jones was in Montgomery, enroute to Tuskegee, Ala., where he tonight delivered a lecture at Booker Washington's school. Sam H. Wredham, a Methodist preacher whose home is at Dothan, Ala., accosted him on the streets and persuaded him to accompany him to the latter's room in a hotel. No sooner were the two in Wredham's room than the preacher turned to Mr. Jones, after first locking the door and placing the key there in his pocket, and said: "God has directed me to go to Dothan, Ala., and get married and to take you with me to perform the ceremony. Then we are to conduct a meeting in Dothan, after which we will return to Montgomery and conduct a meeting here. If you don't assent to this, either you or I must die."

SOME FAMOUS DOUBLES. Working Counterparts of Louis Napoleon and Louis Philippe. The Emperor Napoleon III. had a double of about his own age in the contractor for public fetes during the second empire. His name had escaped my recollection. He had also contracts for soldiers' shoes and uniforms, and he kept his stores at the old hippodrome after the close of a circus company fell in the hands of the contractor started up the very same I saw him. I have sometimes seen a letter dictated by the late Lord Newborough to his son and addressed to me, in which his lordship stated that the first time he saw the citizen king he exclaimed, "What an image of the Queen!" and could not keep his eyes from following him for a while evening. In history we have the false Smerdis. Different impostors passed themselves off as Sebastian, King of Portugal, who was believed to have been killed in a battle with the Moors in Morocco. Miss Jane Porter early in the last century revived the legend in a novel. She sided with those who held Sebastian to have been wounded only and hunted down by Philip IV. of Spain, who seized on his horizons. Three "false Joneses of Ate" appeared in the six years following that of her execution. Two of them avowed every one who had known her.—Paris Cor. London Truth.

### EATING BEFORE SLEEPING.

A Light, Palatable Meal One of the Best Aids to Rest.

A short time since a physician held the eating of food immediately before retiring almost a crime. The old theory is quite exploded. Even a glass of hot milk is grateful to the palate on such occasions, but a bowl of light well cooked soup is better and during the cold months of winter should be the retiring food of every woman who feels, as many do, the need of food at night.—American Cultivator.
