A GOLDSBORO SENSATION. THE BOYS BACK. RAYMOND BYNAM CASE. WILLIAM GORRELL IS WISE. PERSONALS AND SOCIAL.

Dr. J. R. Stockard Sues Dr. D. W. Powell for Alienating His Wife's Affections. Goldsboro, N. C. July 15.—Goldsboro has a sensation in the way of a suit for seduction. The plaintiff in the case is Dr. J. R. Stockard, a dentist, who came here several years ago from Alabama county. Dr. Dan W. Powell is the defendant in the case and the amount asked for in the civil suit is \$10,000. In the bill of indictment Dr. Stockard, who is a married man with a family, sets forth that the defendant has alienated his wife's affections and has broken up and destroyed the peace and happiness of his home. Counsel for plaintiff, Messrs. Dortch & Barham and Messrs. Aycock & Daniels, have asked that the defendant give a bond in the sum of \$5,000. The law says that the bond can be equal to the amount sued for, but the defendant is not worth that much. He is a young physician who has been doing some practice and conducting a small drug store. The case has attracted a great deal of attention and has furnished a theme for conversation since the papers were issued for the arrest of Dr. Powell. Dr. Stockard alleges that Dr. Powell has been intimate with his wife for some time and that he (Dr. Stockard) had ordered Dr. Powell to cease his visits to his home and cease his attentions to his wife. The climax in the scandal occurred during the latter part of June, when Mrs. Stockard left here to visit her people in Alamance county, so she said. Instead of going where she said she went to Burlington and stayed three days. She left Burlington and went to Richmond on the 3rd of July and was joined there by Dr. Powell, who had in the meantime closed up his drug store here and left the city. After waiting a week or so and not hearing from his wife, to whom he had written, Dr. Stockard boarded the train last Sunday morning and went to Burlington, where he learned that his wife had taken a check for her baggage to Richmond. Dr. Stockard went on to Richmond and secured the services of a detective to hunt up his wife. He found her Sunday night at the residence of her uncle in Manchester. He says that Dr. Powell had his wife's trunk at his hotel in Richmond. Before bringing his wife home Dr. Stockard says that he learned that Dr. Powell and his wife had been to Louisville, Ky., and that they had returned to Richmond, where Mrs. Stockard was to run a boarding house. Dr. Stockard brought his wife home last Monday night and Dr. Powell arrived on the scene this week. The preliminary hearing in the civil suit will come up before the clerk of the court on the 3rd of August. Dr. Powell is a young man about 30 years old and unmarried. Mrs. Stockard is a handsome woman and is a mother of three children, the oldest, a daughter being about 15 years of age. Largest We Have Seen. A. A. THE NORMAN PEASANT.

Origin of Wearing Them Traced to Prometheus and the Rock.

In many lands and through many ages a ring has been the symbol of marriage. Young folk are seldom much in love with antiquities, but here is an exception to the rule, for there are few things older than the wedding ring, and in it young people have not yet lost their interest. There has been much outcry against rings politically, but here is the dominating, all attractive, most influential of mergers and of all combinations the hardest to break.

Finger rings have been used as ornaments from the earliest times. There is a Greek story of the origin of their use. Jupiter chained Prometheus to a rock in the Caucasus, where a vulture preyed on his liver, which grew again each night. After 2,000 years of this chronic liver trouble Jupiter released him, but ordered he should wear on his finger an iron ring, having attached to it a piece of the rock, so that the deity might keep his oath of perpetual imprisonment; hence the use of rings of metal with jewels. Rings seem to have been among the first trinkets given and prized. They were tokens of trust, insignia of command, rank and honor, pledges of faith and alliance. They have also been badges of servitude, illustrating the proverb that extremes meet.

Pharaoh gave his ring to Joseph in token of delegated authority. The oldest rings now in existence came from Egypt, having been originally placed on the fingers of the dead. The most interesting ring in the world, at least to antiquarians, is the ring of Cheops, who built the great pyramid. It is of fine gold, weighing about the same as three five-dollar gold pieces.

In early Roman times the ring was worn on the fourth finger of the left hand from a belief that a vein from it passed direct to the heart. An old Jewish legend tells us that Tubal Cain, the first of metal workers, made the first ring for his wife, the earliest marriage record of which we have an authentic record is mentioned in Scripture, where the shy and gentle Isaac placed a ring on the face—probably the nose—of the in novice reluctant Rebekah. Isaac was always timid, and he would surely have managed the delicate matter more appropriately himself.

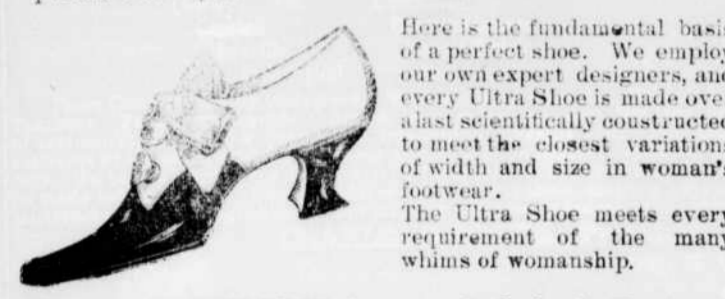
