

Editor of Norfolk Virginian Pilot Dead
Norfolk, Va., Aug. 8.—Charles S. Pinkney, editor of the Norfolk Virginian Pilot, died early Sunday morning about 7 o'clock of a heart ailment. He was 65 years of age. He was a native of Virginia and had been in Norfolk for many years. He was a member of the Norfolk Press Club and the Norfolk Press Association. He was a very popular man and his death is a great loss to the community.

The Armour Car Company, which has a monopoly of furnishing refrigerator cars to move berries and other small fruits, last season caused the farmers of the berry growing section of North Carolina a loss of hundreds of thousands of dollars through failure to furnish cars promptly. Fortunately the laws are such that the farmers were enabled to recover part of this loss from the car company. But the company has shown its greed and a spirit of retaliation by declaring that it will advance rates for moving the berries next season or refuse to come into the territory for shipments. The berry growing farmers are at the mercy of the car company and as yet no remedy has been offered.

That martin shooting in the hot region on Wrightsville sound has resulted in a clash between the heart of health and game warden of New Hanover county. The board of health held a meeting at which the county physician stated that the appearance of the birds in such large numbers at the place in question was a menace to health, whereupon the owner of the premises was given permission to have the nuisance abated. Expert Snow has announced that he believed the wheat crop would be fully 725,000,000 bushels. This is 170,000,000 more than last year. In addition to this Canada will have a crop of 70,000,000. In 1901 the wheat crop in the United States was 748,000,000, but Canada produced a very small crop.
