WOMEN AS HARD WORKERS.

Labor So Heavy That the Strongest Become Useless at Thirty.
In Warsaw I once saw a troop of women going back and forth from a building in process of construction, emptying hods of dirt and carrying in hods of brick or mortar. They were splendid women physically, with broad shoulders and hips, strong limbs and stout ankles, but they were all young, and when I inquired why it was the foreman said, "The work does for them in a very short time, and when they break down they are no longer of use to us." At thirty the women are already old and unfit for further usefulness to the purchasers of labor, so they sit at home like grandmothers, waiting the passing of their time. Indeed, throughout Poland and Russia one sees women bearing burdens which seem far beyond their strength.

In all the countries of Europe one sees them engaged in occupations of the most laborious kind. There is no more revolting sight than to see women doing the work of dumb animals. Here and there one sees a girl harnessed to a cart or pushing a heavily loaded wheelbarrow. On the canals and rivers everywhere women take turns with men in pushing with heavy poles or in pulling the long freighted canal boats. Here they are competing with navvies on the railroad, and there serving as hod-carriers. Now and then one sees them in the coal pits and about the iron works. In certain industries there is no limit to their hours. On the boats, for instance, they must work both night and day to get the cargo to market. In this way women become beasts of burden and remain so until they are physically ruined.—Robert Hunter in Cosmopolitan.

When You Speak.
Bishop Brooks of Boston occasionally used to surprise those not intimately acquainted with him by sitting silently while conversation was going on around him briskly. The bishop explained his rather unwonted taciturnity by relating that on one occasion while seated in a railroad train opposite an intelligent looking man the latter seemed about to say something. "I beg your pardon," said the bishop, "were you about to make a remark?" "No," was the reply. "Oh, I thought you looked as if you were going to say something to me," answered the bishop apologetically. "Yes, I am said to be very descriptive that way. I used to say things and make remarks as soon as I thought them. I have often thought I had something to say and discovered after I had said it that I ought to have kept silent." And the bishop would conclude his story by saying, "I have found myself in the same position more than once, so I do not speak until I am reasonably sure that I have something to say."

The New Candy Girl.
"The way we encase the contingency of having all our goods eaten by our 'unhappy' people," says the manager of a large candy shop, "is to place no restriction on them whatever. Indeed, when we find a new girl has an unusually large sweet tooth we are apt to tell her or let her know in some way that she is at liberty to help herself. She takes advantage of this license for a period of time, ranging from two days to a week, but she generally gets enough in a shorter period than the latter and therefore lets the candy severely alone. Sometimes, indeed, she orders a large quantity of candy at once, for it much as she eats it she also carries it and consumes the candy at her own pace. A little while on a large scale, the palate, but a full imagination of the supercharged atmosphere is equivalent to a full meal."—Philadelphia Record.

Tea in Russia.
Russians are very careful about the way their tea is made. They make it in a porcelain or earthen teapot and drink it from tumbler of glass so arranged that there is no danger of the tea being broken by them. Their tea is always made of water at the first boiling, an important matter. The tea brewed in the teapot is made quite strong, but the tea glasses are but one-third filled with this tea and then filled up with boiling water. This gives a delicate, fine flavored cup of tea not strong enough to have a rank taste.

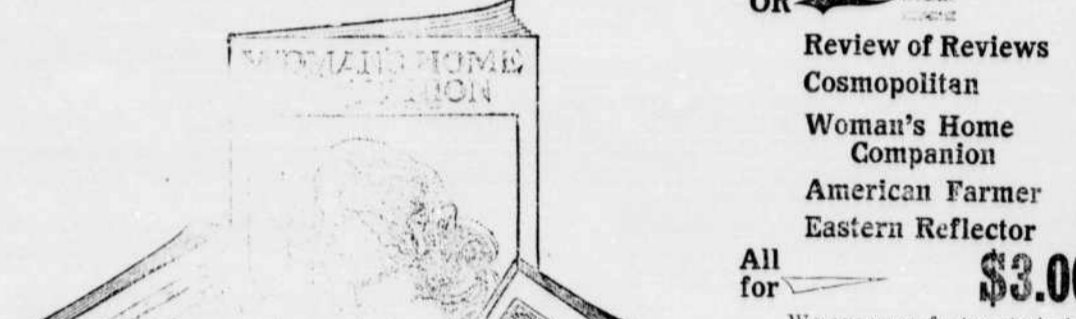
