WHAT IS A MUMMY?

A Chapter of Information About Some Egyptian Customs.
When a member of an Egyptian family died all the relatives put on mourning and abstained from baths, wine and delicacies of all kinds from forty to sixty days, according to the rank of the person deceased. Death in one respect put an end to all distinctions that had prevailed in life, and king and slave were subject to the same law.
The record of the life of the deceased had to be examined by a tribunal of forty-two judges before he could be given burial with his ancestors. If the deeds of his life proved that he was worthy of burial his body was carried across the sacred lake, of which each province had one, and was there permitted to rest. If the judges found him unworthy, even though he belonged to the highest rank, he could not be buried with his ancestors. The body was returned to his relatives and was buried on the side of the lake opposite to the burial place of the just.
The belief of the Egyptians in a future state of existence gave rise to the practice of embalming the dead. They wished to carefully preserve the body, so that the soul upon its return to its former abode at the end of all things might find it ready for its reception. Bodies were embalmed in three different ways. The most expensive and magnificent method was used upon the bodies of kings and other persons of distinguished rank, the cost amounting to a talent of silver, or \$610.
A number of persons were employed in the process of embalming, and they were treated with great respect. They filled the cavities of the body with myrrh, cinnamon, spices and many kinds of sweet smelling drugs.
After a certain time had elapsed the body was swathed in lawn fillets, which were glued together with a kind of thin gum, and then crusted over with costly perfumes. By this mode of embalming the shape of the body, the lineaments of the face, the eyebrows and eyelashes were preserved in their natural perfection. Bodies thus embalmed are what we now call Egyptian mummies.

Greek Humor.

Thus unburdened, the ship arrived at the land, whereupon Xerxes presented the captain with a golden crown for having saved the king's life and then ordered his head cut off for having caused the death of so many noble Persians.

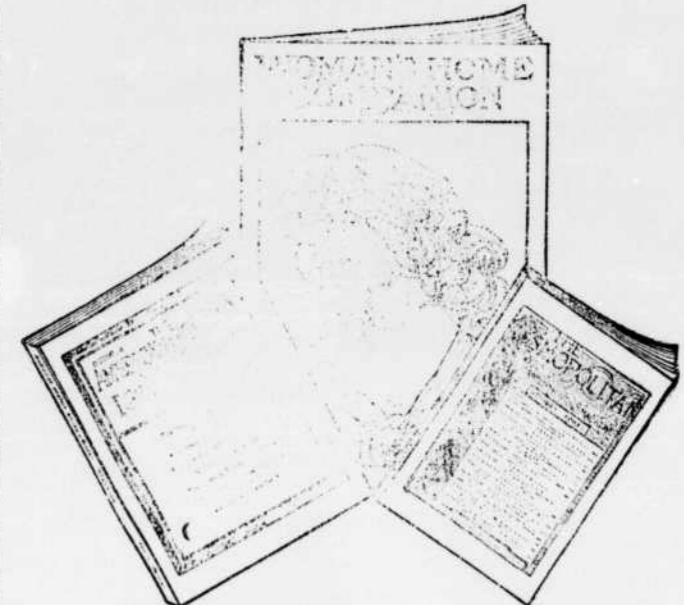

A regular blizzard is raging out West and the tail end of it may be expected to switch down this way.

If all Mrs. Duke says about him is true, the president of the tobacco trust made anything else but a good husband.

The capacity of Durham jail is to be doubled. It will be needed unless there are some changes around that town.

Another train added to the transportation facilities of the towns down this way increases that much more their advantages.

Governor Glenn is credited with saying "I have but one ambition, and that is to make North Carolina a good governor." He is doing that.

Mrs. Chadwick raises a kick at having to take her turn at the wash-tub in the Ohio penitentiary. Not quite as easy job as fleecing the bankers.

The slump in cotton futures does not seem warranted by the ginners' report, but the fellow who puts up his money has to take chances on the other fellow's game.

The officers promise that the next State fair shall be clean, in regard to fakirs and side shows. We have heard that promise before, in fact it comes annually about this time of year.

Every little helps, and every prisoner sentenced by the courts to work on the roads is something in that direction, but it will take a long time to get good roads in that way. Until the people become thoroughly aroused as to the need of good roads and are willing to pay something for them, there will not be any worthy the name.

The President is going at the thing right when he ordered the correction of the abuses in the government printing office, provided he does not let the order fall short of execution. If there ever was a place where extravagance runs riot, it is in that same government print shop. Enough money is wasted there every year on unnecessary printing to run several good size printing establishments.

If people living along the rural free delivery routes want the routes continued, they should go to taking more newspapers so as to give more mail for the carriers to handle. It is said the postoffice department is considering plans to discontinue all routes that handle less than 2,000 packages a month. The routes are a great help to the people, and they should show enough interest not to allow any to be discontinued.

There's Danger In It.

Says one Norfolk Landmark:

"The Southern Cotton Growers' Association has resolved to reduce the cotton acreage 25 per cent. and hold the product until the price reaches 15 cents a pound. It is a question whether the individual members are willing to do the first or able to do the second. If they should succeed in their effort, the result would be a tremendous stimulus to the movement to raise cotton on a large scale in other parts of the world."

Then if the foreigners began to raise cotton and the South would put in a big acreage and run prices down to 5 cents, it would be awful on the foreigners. It takes the proper climate, suitable land, plenty of labor and ample transportation facilities for cotton production. There are no doubt many countries that have the climate and land but we've got them skinned to a finish on labor and transportation. Until there is some cotton country with the area of the South and traversed with railroads and waterways like the Southern "Cotton Belt," we don't think there is any need to fear competition. At any rate there is no need for the South to raise cotton at cost to scare competition.—Wilmington Star.

The executive committee of the North Carolina branch of the Southern Cotton Association authorized the appointment of four assistants as organizers in the State. Col. J. S. Cunningham, ex-president, was voted \$250. reimbursement and \$50 will also be spent in purchasing a token of appreciation for his services during his term which recently expired. The salary of the president was fixed at \$135 per month, with expenses for office and secretary and treasurer, the fixing of whose salary is left to the president. More than \$5,000 has been so far subscribed. The committee will hold a meeting at an early date to decide as to other matters. The permanent office of the secretary will be located at Raleigh. The secretary will be required to spend all his time looking after the details of that office.

It has got to be howling cold once more. This is just another of the changes in the weather.

BAD IMMIGRANTS.

Junior Order is Opposed to Them.

Local Councils of the Junior Order of the United American Mechanics throughout the State have adopted stirring resolutions in regard to immigration, which will be sent to Washington.

The following is a copy: "Whereas, we recognize the leading light upon our shores of the ignorant, the vicious, the lawless, the aged, the embezzle, the weak-minded and of poor physique, and the paupers of the old world as a constant menace to our institutions, and believe that it should be viewed with alarm by all loyal and patriotic citizens of the entire country, and, Whereas, notorious abuses have resulted from careless and unlawful granting of citizenship to aliens.

"Therefore, be it resolved, that we urge upon Senators and Congressmen the importance of the enactment of laws to restrict immigration by an increase of the tax, the educational test, a thorough physical examination and a more rigid inspection at the port of embarkation, and, "Be it further resolved, that we urge upon Senators and Congressmen the importance of a revision of our system of naturalization certificates, confine the jurisdiction of naturalizing aliens to United States Courts, and permit no alien to be naturalized or entitled to the privileges of an elector until he shall have resided within the United States two years at least, and is able to read intelligently and write."

Representative Maynard, of Virginia, introduced in Congress a bill authorizing the government to participate in the Jamestown Exposition, providing an appropriation of \$1,340,000 for buildings, etc., also providing for the coinage of a million two-dollar silver pieces as souvenirs, the exposition company paying the cost of the bullion and receiving the face value of the pieces. The profit would be \$800,000 and it is believed the coins would be very saleable.

That is what an English writer calls his Country.

It is difficult to talk much about being "a gentleman" and behaving like a gentleman, says an English writer, without betraying an inward and invisible want of breeding. The "grace" which is the true word for what we mean by gentlemanly qualities should never be dwelt upon, although its absence should be denounced. That grace of soul, of feeling, of habit, of manner and of conduct which should attract no attention, no surprise, no eulogy, is born in a person and can never be acquired, although a stratum of good manners, which is all that the majority mean by "gentlemanly," is often the result of education. "You have the grace of God," said Launcelot Gobbo when he meant to convey that Bassanio was a gentleman, and I wish that more of us were Gobbos in the art of expression.

Through Spain we arrive at the paradox that the most aristocratic country in Europe is also the most democratic. One cannot imagine a Spaniard asking another "to behave like a gentleman," for there is only one standard of behavior in Spain. The omnibus conductor, exchanging cigarettes with the grandee, will exhibit as much mastery of the charming courtesies of life as his "superior," as we should call the grandee in England.

REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

Recommendations Made to the Court. To His Honor, B. F. Long, Judge presiding, Pitt County Superior Court, January term, 1906: We, the grand jury for the term just past, report as follows: 1st. That we have acted on all bills received that we could find witnesses for. 2nd. That a committee of four jurors consisting of A. G. Cox, W. E. Ellis, J. F. Harrington and C. H. Langston was sent to the county home of the aged and infirm who have submitted a written report to us, which report we have accepted and that said report is hereto annexed as a report of the grand jury for that institution. 3rd. That we have visited the jail and the convict camp (which is in the jail) and find the jail and convict camp in a very clean condition, and the prisoners and convicts well fed and cared for, and that the superintendent of the convicts is a worthy and competent man for that place. We recommend that iron berths be placed in the cells three tiers high, so that the bedding could be better cared for and by this means give more room in the apartments. We also recommend that the cells be furnished with combination or ratchet locks to make them secure. We also recommend that the inside walls of the jail be sealed with sheet iron to prevent prisoners from escaping. 4th. That we have visited the offices of the clerk, register of deeds and the sheriff and find them and their books in good condition. We recommend that the children of Abram Galloway have a guardian appointed to look after their estate. We also recommend that a good desk be put in the clerk's office for his and the public's benefit. We also recommend that the books in the register of deeds office where land is recorded be re-indexed so that citizens can more readily find their deeds, etc., recorded. We also recommend that the floor of the sheriff's office be laid in wood to make more healthful. We also recommend that an electric light be placed at the top of the two stairways leading to the court room. We also recommend that some seats be furnished in the hallway of the court house that witnesses who are waiting to go before the grand jury may be comfortably seated. All of which we most respectfully submit to you, Hon. B. F. Long, Judge presiding, on this 22nd day of January, 1906. C. D. ROUNTREE, Foreman Grand Jury. SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT. We our committee appointed to review the premises of the county home respectfully submit the following report: We find the church needs improving and elevated more from the ground, also some needed repairs to the roof, and the grave yard back of church needs some repairs by filling up graves which have caved in. And upon investigation we find pest houses in good condition, though in danger of fire should the woods get burned that surrounds them. The land under cultivation in fair condition. We visited all the inmates and find 21 in number, and from what information we could gain they seemed to be cared for as well as could be expected under existing circumstances. The building is in a very comfortable condition. After viewing the situation we recommend that for comfort, convenience and appearance that it would be advisable to build (and should be built at once) a dormitory where the better class of inmates could be cared for better and use the best buildings for such inmates as they are best suited for. We find Mr. John A. Hardee, the manager of our county home, and from what we could learn Mr. Hardee is kind and attentive to them; but we find Hardee is often under the influence of strong drink. LOVITT'S SLAYERS ON TRIAL.

JERRY COBB SURRENDERS TO OFFICERS AT FARMVILLE.

Testimony in the Case Against Jerry Cobb and Sylvester Barrett. Jerry Cobb, the other negro against whom the grand jury found a true bill for murder...

Mr. F. G. James appeared with Solicitor L. I. Moore for the State and Col. I. A. Sugg, Messrs. F. C. Harding and Julius Brown represented the defendants. Counsel for the defense asked for severance of the case given them separate trials...

The jury empaneled consisted of Jesse Tyson, H. A. Paramore, Henry Edwards, Charles Dudley, J. F. Boyd, Jr., J. H. Byrum, J. M. Williams, A. B. Kittrell, J. C. Stocks, James Harrington, J. R. Jenkins and J. I. James.

DR. J. E. NOBLES examined the body said to be that of Walter Lovitt, at his father's home near Farmville, Sunday afternoon. Found wound in upper part of abdomen about four inches above navel...

DR. C. C. JOYNER. I knew Walter Lovitt and was present when he was killed. He was constable and I went to show him where Jerry Cobb lived...

J. F. CASE. I was near scene of killing also at house when body was examined. It was Walter Lovitt's body. He was constable of Farmville township...

Cross examination--I was called there by coroner. These ten shot are all I extracted from wound, they came from in and around liver; no shot went into through body...

Cross examination--There were warrants for five or six when Lovitt left Farmville. I knew where all lived and went to show the way. One of the men we met in the road did the shooting. I did not see the gun...

Cross examination--I saw many other colored people that evening; I do not know how any of them were dressed. I was about a minute after they passed Parker's when the shooting occurred...

DR. C. C. JOYNER. I know Sylvester Barrett. He came to my house between 12 and 1 o'clock Saturday night, knocked at my door, told me he wanted to leave a gun there...

DR. R. R. CARR.

I knew Walter Lovitt. A little after 9 o'clock he came and asked me to go with him to arrest some men. Went and searched some houses, Barrett's house among them...

At the afternoon session of the court J. F. Case continued his testimony: It was very short time after defendants passed me before gun fired...

Cross examination--I do not know how many Lovitt had warrants for, he called Jerry Cobb's name. We stopped one crowd on road to see if Cobb was among them...

WALTER LOVIT was my son. He told me he had warrants for Barrett and Cobb and asked me to go with him to serve them...

Cross examination--I went to Farmville about one o'clock Saturday and left about sunset. The trouble with negroes in road was before dark. Several negroes were in the road...

Cross examination--My son and myself were in Dr. Joyner's buggy. There was a gun in this buggy.

I know the defendants. About one minute before the shooting I was standing in front of my house, within 5 feet of road...

DR. C. C. JOYNER. I knew Walter Lovitt and was present when he was killed. He was constable and I went to show him where Jerry Cobb lived...

Cross examination--It was 25 or 30 yards from my gate to where shooting occurred. I don't know if any one else went by but these two defendants, Case and Fulford came up to my gate together...

I went to Farmville Saturday evening. Lovitt asked me to go out with them to see warrants. I went out with Case. We went to Jerry Cobb's house and found no one there...

Cross examination--There were warrants for five or six when Lovitt left Farmville. I knew where all lived and went to show the way. One of the men we met in the road did the shooting...

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ROBERT BELCHER.

My brother carried Walter Lovitt's buggy back to Farmville before shooting occurred. There was a gun in it which he said was Dr. Joyner's.

I know Sylvester Barrett. He came to my house between 12 and 1 o'clock Saturday night, knocked at my door, told me he wanted to leave a gun there...

Cross examination--I issued warrant Saturday night, it came back to me Sunday morning at preliminary hearing. In meantime Lovitt had been killed...

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SYLVESTER BARRETT TO HANG.

JERRY COBB 25 YEARS IN THE PENITENTIARY.

Barrett Convicted of Murder in First Degree and Cobb in Second Degree. Both Take Appeal in Forma Pauperis.

"And may God have mercy on your soul."

These were the closing words of Judge B. F. Long in passing sentence of death upon Sylvester Barrett, convicted of the murder of Constable W. J. Lovitt, of Farmville, the date of execution being set on Friday, February 16th, between the hours of 6 a. m. and 2 p. m.

The argument of counsel in the murder was completed Friday afternoon, Judge Long made his charge and gave the case to the jury at 5 o'clock. The last 8 o'clock at night the ringing of the court house bell announced that a verdict had been reached. A large crowd hurried to the court house and in a few moments the room was packed. A solemn silence prevailed as the jury was polled and the verdict announced.

The verdict was "the defendant Sylvester Barrett is guilty of murder in the first degree, and the defendant Jerry Cobb is guilty of murder in the second degree."

Barrett displayed no emotion at any time during the progress of the trial and was not moved in the least by the verdict, while Cobb smiled as if pleased that his neck had been saved.

The prisoners were ordered back to jail, Judge Long reserving passing sentence until this morning. At the opening of court this morning counsel for Cobb moved for a new trial, which motion was denied, and he was sentenced to 25 years in the penitentiary at hard labor. Appeal to Supreme Court in forma pauperis was taken.

Counsel for Barrett also made a motion for new trial, which was denied, and sentence was passed upon him to be hanged by the neck until he is dead on the date above stated. Appeal to Supreme Court in forma pauperis was also taken in his case.

No one was hurt.

It seems that some people do not know that they violate the postal laws when they send packages through the mail marked merchandise and also include written letters in the packages. First class matter must be sent separate from merchandise and there is a penalty of \$10 for sending letters with merchandise.
