If our sun were removed to the Pleiades it would hardly be visible in an opera glass, with which nearly 100 stars can be seen in the cluster. Sixty or seventy Pleiades surpass our sun in brilliancy, Aleyone being 1,000 times more brilliant, Electra pearly 500 times and Maia nearly 400. "Sirius itself takes a subord: nate rank when compared with the tive most brilliant members of a group, the real magnificence of which we can thus in some degre apprehend." If we seek to know the dimensions, not of the individual stars, but of the cluster itself, we are met with many difficulties, but on the assumption that it is approximately spherical in share we can calculate its diameter to be over 40,000,000,000 miles, so that light would take seven years to pass from one extreme to the other. If we think of the dimensions of our solar system by themselves or in relation to terrestrial matters they appear stupendously enormous.
