IMMENSITY OF THE HEAVENS

A Peep into Space That Dazzles the Imagination.

If our sun were removed to the Pleiades it would hardly be visible in an opera glass, with which nearly 100 stars can be seen in the cluster. Sixty or seventy Pleiades surpass our sun in brilliancy. A young being 1,000 times more brilliant, Electrically 500 times and Maia nearly 400. "Sirius itself takes a subordinate rank when compared with the five most brilliant members of a group, the real magnitude of which we can thus in some degree apprehend." If we seek to know the dimensions, not of the individual stars, but of the cluster itself, we are met with many difficulties, but on the assumption that it is approximately spherical in shape we can calculate its diameter to be over 40,000,000,000 miles. As that light would take seven years to pass from one extreme to the other. If we think of the dimensions of our solar system by themselves or in relation to terrestrial matters they appear stupendously enormous.

Neptune, the most distant known member, has an orbit over 5,000,000,000 miles across—a distance that a ray of light would travel in seven and a half hours—but the solar system is to the Pleiades but as a Lilliputian to a Brooding Giant—is but as a microbe to a mountain, for a sphere the size of the solar system would, if it were spherical and its diameter that of the orbit of Neptune, be relatively so minute that it could be contained more than 400,000,000,000 times in a sphere the size of the Pleiades. In other words, the limits of the Pleiades could contain 150 solar systems as many times over as there are miles between Neptune and the sun.

It must not be forgotten that, although there are 2,500 stars in the cluster, yet with such dimensions for the entire group vast distances must separate the stars from one another. In fact, 2,500 spheres, each with a diameter of 3,000,000,000 miles, could be contained in the limits assigned to the group, and assuming equal distribution of the stars in the group, each would be at the center of a sphere 3,000,000,000 miles across, and therefore a light journey of 187 days from its nearest neighbor.

Where Fat is Beauty.

Of the elevating influence of women in the American sense Moore knows nothing, according to Budget Meakin, author of "Life in Morocco." There they are, in fact, so many goods and chattels. That a woman should be fat and comely is the highest thought a Moor has on the position of women. If a girl is to be married and is thought to be too thin, she is put through a course of "stufing," just as if she were a turkey meant for the Christmas market. "This consists of swallowing after each full meal a few small sausage shaped boluses of flour, honey and butter, flavored with aniseed or something similar. A few months of this treatment give a marvelous rotundity to the figure, thus greatly increasing her charms to the native eye."

If the weather turns up bad by Easter there will be many disappointed ladies.

When the carpet comes up will be a good time to take a day off and go fishing.

Greenville ought to have a board of trade representing all the business interests of the town.

The Atlanta woman seems very proud that Mr. Carnegie kissed her, but other folks don't look at it that way.

Those places that wanted to secure the Seaboard Air Line shops can now talk about what they did not get.

When our streets and sidewalks are made the brunt of jokes from the stage, it is time the town was up and doing.

That tired feeling is not particular about whom it strikes, but we would feel more like writing "copy" if it had skipped us.

The next thing with the Greene and Gairner case is to see what the jury will do with it. After many weeks of hearing testimony the jury has at last got the case.

Raleigh gets the teachers and Greensboro gets the convention, so both can have something to talk about and call it even.

A business man remarked that The Daily Reflector would have to enlarge again if its advertising patronage keeps growing. It is getting to look that way, and we will keep in line to meet the requirements.

The Home Building and Loan Association of Greenville is well offered. Those chosen to manage its affairs are men of known business integrity and entitled to the fullest confidence of the public. Now let all work together to make it the greatest aid to Greenville's development the town has ever had.

Congressman John H. Small may be conscientious in his advocacy of an appropriation for the fast mail on the Southern railway, but we believe his position is wrong and regret that he is on that side of the question. He is prompted by a desire to do all he can for the South, but where this leads to the payment of a subsidy it is wrong. The fast mail is a good thing for the immediate section through which it operates, but the government pays entirely too much for such a service.

Greenville has organized a building and loan association and it will mean for the town just what the town makes of it. These things do not run themselves—Durham Herald.

The Herald is right. The association is not going to run itself, but the people must make it run. That is just what Greenville has started out to do with her association, make it accomplish something for the town and not merely drag along. Still it is a timely warning "that it will mean for the town just what the town makes it."

There will soon be grass enough for the "Keep off" signs.

That the mail subsidy won by only a majority of three votes shows a growing sentiment against it.

The Reflector acknowledges an invitation to the inauguration of Prof. E. L. Moffitt as president of Elon College, on May 2nd.

Good for the North Carolina boys. In a game of ball played at Richmond Saturday between the teams of Trinity College and Harvard, our boys won.

Greene and Gaynor stole over half a million apiece and got four year sentences. If it had been a five dollar forgery the sentence might have been longer.

The man who starts out to have some building done now runs up against something. The price of lumber is several times higher than it was a few years ago.

In a few days more the sheriff will not be troubling himself about collecting poll taxes. It will then be up between you and the ballot box if yours is not paid.

The Durham papers say he has now decided to employ counsel for his defense. He is one man any lawyer ought to be too honest to defend. He is hardly worthy a trial.

Is North Carolina doing anything toward having a creditable exhibit at the Jamestown Exposition next year? We should not be content with the fact that Norfolk is so largely made up of our folks that it will be almost our exposition any way, but there should be such an exhibit from the Old North State as will show them and the visitors that there are lots of good things "down home."

We notice one exchange which classifies items puts its slating rink news under society notes. That is not bad, either, for as far as our skating rink knowledge goes they are all there.
