EDITOR REFLECTOR:

In the editorial columns of yesterday's Reflector we note that you state that you understand that a representative of the Southeastern Tariff Association was recently here looking over the town with a view of fixing the fire insurance rates for Greenville for the next year.

In this connection we beg to advise you, and through your paper the people of Greenville, that by a unanimous adoption by the Greenville local board of fire underwriters of resolutions setting forth the improvements of our town, Mr. D. B. Taylor, special agent of the association, has come to Greenville for the purpose of revising and reducing the rates for fire insurance here.

We also beg to advise that Representative Taylor is still here, and will be for several days, and that he is now going over our rates making the proper reductions. It will probably be thirty days before this work can be completed, but it is progressing rapidly.

Had the two officers of the Greenville Local Board of Fire Underwriters felt as much interest before as after in letting us, and through the paper the people of Greenville, know that such a meeting was in contemplation, the Reflector would have been only too glad to be present.

The editorial referred to was written the day before the meeting in question was held, and it had its purpose which we hope will bear fruit. That purpose was to remind the business men of Greenville that they should have an organization—a board of trade or chamber of commerce—through which to make themselves heard unitedly on just such matters as this.

**MODERN AFRICA.**

**The Partitioning of the Continent Among the Powers.**

By 1855 the partition of Africa had become an established fact. Almost every square mile of its surface having been scoured by the great powers of Europe, the most remarkable circumstance of this gigantic acquisition of territory was the absence of international strife.

Africa emerged from the struggle of the chicaneries of Europe to find itself provided with new masters in many directions. France had become the possessor of 3,300,000 square miles of territory, 1,600,000 of which lay in the great Sahara desert; Great Britain of 2,200,000; Germany, a newcomer, of nearly 1,000,000; Italy, also a new arrival, of 500,000, including a doubtfully assigned claim upon Abyssinia; Spain of 150,000; the three free states or republics—Liberia, Belgian and Africander Ditch—of 1,150,000.

The oldest colonies, Turkey and Portugal, claimed 2,200,000 and 825,000. A total in all of 11,370,000, leaving the poor little fraction of 230,000 unallotted, of which 70,000 lay in the great lakes and most of the remainder in the balance of boundary commissions.

By 1895 Britain, in annexing the South African republics and establishing with Egypt a joint control of the Sudan, added 800,000 to her total, and with her practical control of the destinies of Egypt took today the virtual ruler over some 3,300,000 square miles.

No partition of such a vast portion of the world's surface had ever taken place in so short a space of time, nor any one of even approaching magnitude, without severe and bloody human struggles. Britain had undoubtedly secured the lion's share, or perhaps the only share in which men of European descent could live and prosper materially and physically.

Africa possessed unique, though perhaps unattractive features for successful development. Lying mainly, as it does, 30 degrees north and south of the equator, it was essentially the tropical continent. Its physical features resembled no other continent.—Lieutenant Colonel Sir Percy Croft in Scribner's "Africa."

**THE OLDEST LOCK.**

**It Formerly secured a Door in a Palace at Nineveh.**

The very oldest lock in existence is one which formerly secured one of the doors of a palace of Nineveh. It is a gigantic affair, and the key to it, which is as large as one man can conveniently carry, reminds one of the Scriptural passage where the prophet makes reference to such instruments being carried on the shoulder. The exact words of the passage referred to are, "And the key of the house of David I will lay upon his shoulder."

This enormous key to the lock from Nineveh is nearly three and a half feet in length and of the thickness of a four inch drapline. It was found at the end of a ruined chamber, where a large wooden door had probably once stood, the gigantic brass hinges and heavy bars being still in fair condition, though somewhat corroded. The relief of the olden times has but few points of resemblance to the keys of modern manufacture or even to those of the early part of the Christian era. The tubular idea had never been thought out in those days, though the key is feathery and wonderfully made, being equally as intricate a piece of machinery as the lock in which it was used. A great many of the bars and pegs in the lock are believed to have been made of wood, as their places are now empty. The notes and reports of the relief, however, show that there were corresponding pegs and bars in the lock at one time. The great lateral iron bars at the end of the key, with their complicated series of notches, crosses, bumps, etc., are proof that the lock was once similarly provided. This being the case, it is reasonable to suppose that at one time the door to the palace could not have been opened until the key had been inserted and the impediment to the drawing back of the bolt removed by raising up so many bars and pins, as the key had fallen down into its places upon the key having been withdrawn. Similar locks and keys were in use in Egypt 5,000 years ago.

**Gift Picture Frames.**

Gift picture frames may be cleaned by mixing (thoroughly) one tablespoonful of melted soap with half a pint of boiling water. Add to this a wineglassful of spirits of hartshorn, and mix them well together. Apply this with a small, soft brush, and after allowing this lotion to remain on for a minute wash it carefully off with clean water, and dry the frame in the sunshine.

**Shell and scald them, leaving in the water for ten minutes or until the skins slip off easily. Shake in a towel and spread in the sun for an hour to get perfectly dry. Put them into a baking pan, stirring up well with a teaspoonful of melted butter. Set the pan in an oven when the nuts are all coated with the butter and brown very lightly, stirring often to cook them evenly. Turn into a colander, sift fine salt over them and shake and toss gently to free them of surplus salt and butter. Keep in a cool place.**
