NO LAWYERS BY AND BY.
Col. James Hamilton Lewis, corporation counsel of Chicago, politician, former Congressman, wit and after-dinner speaker, says: "In eight hundred years, yes, before that period has elapsed—the lawyer will be without a profession."

"The law is in the midst of great changes," he said to a Chicago Post writer. "I believe that in 50 years the evolution will have progressed so far that we will have a tribunal something like those of ancient Greece, where any man, whether he be lawyer or not, can go and present his case."

"The lawyer, except as an advocate, is disappearing from the world. The necessity for him is waning. Men are learning to get together and settle their business matters or their troubles without him."

There was a time when the law offered a man preferment honors, social esteem, and everything to be desired. Not so today. The lawyer is looked upon as a parasite, feeding on the body politic. On every hand we see lawyers turning away from the practice of their profession and getting into channels of life offering them better returns for their abilities.

"I say without hesitation that the lawyer is the lowest paid worker in any class of endeavor to be cited, considering what he puts into his work. Take the corporation lawyer getting perhaps \$2,500 or \$3,000 a year. He makes it possible for his employers to accumulate millions."

THE READING OF NEWSPAPERS.
It may be said without contradiction, that it is only the exceptional person that reads the daily newspaper so as to be able to have any coherent idea of its contents an hour after the paper has been laid aside. The newspaper reader as a rule, reads just the portion which is of personal or individual concern or interest, social or religious, of finance or of sports, and the rest of the paper is passed over.

Two phases of newspaper reading, or the neglect of it, perhaps a combination of each, are worthy of special consideration, these being the quickness with which the reader of the newspaper will see an article, be it good or bad, of a personal nature, and the extreme impossibility of becoming able to see other articles in the same paper, which may be equally personal but yet of a different character.

An article of a complimentary kind, will be noted at a glance on a page of matter, as will also the article which may be uncompromising. The newspaper reader will quickly see either of these, but let an advertising notice be set in prominent type, calling attention to the fact that taxes are due, and the tax-payer will swear that he never saw the notice, although he looked over the newspaper every day for a month. But let the same tax-payer be found a delinquent and he will note that his name is published in the first issue of the paper, although it be on an inside page, and the smallest type set in and surrounded with a hundred other names.—New York Herald.

Eminent Doctors Praise its Ingredients.
From one dozen sprigs of fresh mint carefully remove the bruised leaves, which give a rank flavor. In a quart jar shake one cup of crushed ice and one-half cup of sugar until the sugar is dissolved. Add the mint, pour over it one tablespoonful of pure cider vinegar or lemon juice. Add one cup of currant juice or one glass of currant jelly and water to make one quart. If the currant jelly be used omit the sugar wholly or in part. — Good House-keeping.

Overalls For Children.

Children's white dress sleeves can be kept perfectly clean at the table if a small pair of extra sleeves of white are made with an elastic inserted at the top and at the wrist. They can be made of any light-weight material and are easily laundered. The oversleeves will also be found useful when the children are at play, as the cuffs of a dress soil quickly.

To Clean a Rusty Pot.

To remove rust from a kettle put into it as much hay as it will hold, fill it with water and boil it many hours. If the kettle is not entirely fit for use, repeat the process. It will be certainly effectual. Rub the rusty spots on the stove with sand-paper, then with sweet oil.

Spiced Apple Jelly.

If a small bag of spice is placed in the kettle when making apple or crab apple jelly the flavor will be much improved, and it varies the jelly without effort. A few leaves of sweet geranium thrown into the jelly also gives a delicious flavor.

Ironing Colored Goods.

When ironing colored blouses, no matter of what material, don't use a very hot iron. An overheat iron injures the colors, making them look dull and faded. All calicoes, gingham and chintzes should be ironed on the wrong side.

Cleaning Vegetables.

After washing green vegetables two or three teaspoonfuls of vinegar should be put into the next water. This not only makes the vegetables nice and crisp, but also draws out any insects that may be hidden in the leaves.

Cuban Coffee.

To serve coffee in Cuban fashion put three pints of sweet rich milk into the brightest of new coffee pots, and let it come to a boil. Put in ten cups of ground coffee and boil five minutes. Strain and serve.
