OVERWORKED EMPLOYEES. The Corporation Commission in a sort of uncertainty way made a report on the wreck near Hamlet Sunday, July 22, when more than twenty persons were killed and forty wounded. It looks like railroad employes are frequently overworked, and doubtless that causes some wrecks.

MEETING OF ALDERMEN.

Business Transacted—Tax Levy Recommended But Deferred—Ficklen Wall Ordered Rebuilt.

The board of aldermen met in regular monthly session Thursday night seven members being present. The finance committee made a report approximating the needs of the town for the current fiscal year and recommended the following tax law for the year: For general purposes 54 cents on each \$100 valuation of real and personal property and \$1.02 cents on each poll. Interest on improvement bonds 21 cents on each \$100 valuation and 65 cents on each poll. Maintenance of grades 40 cents on each \$100 valuation and \$1.20 on each poll. This makes a total of \$1.15 on each \$100 valuation and \$3.45 on each poll, and a reduction of 10 cents and 30 cents respectively from the levy of last year.

The returns to the list taker of taxes for the year shows real and personal property to the amount of \$1,309,000 and 489 polls. The recommendation of the finance committee was not acted on at present but on motion was deferred for consideration at an adjourned meeting. Also several committees had nothing special to report.

The chairman of the water and light commission reported that the plant was running very satisfactorily and that the new dynamo for operating day current had arrived. He also made some statements relative to the contemplated sewerage system.

The several officers made their reports for the past month. The dispensary report showed purchases during the past month of \$5,579.78 and cash sales \$4,148.

The superintendent of the water and light plant reported seven new water customers and twenty-two new customers during the month and income about \$755. The board at a special meeting considered the matter of damage to E. B. Ficklen from the washing down of a brick wall on his premises, having referred the matter to a committee of arbitration, that committee decided that the town should have the wall rebuilt before and so reported to the board. It was ordered that a check be made with C. V. York for the wall for the sum of \$135.

Licenses to conduct restaurants were granted to W. G. Wason and E. L. Warrington. The bonds of the treasurer and manager of the dispensary were presented and accepted. Accounts were allowed amounting to \$809.34. A recess was taken to Tuesday night, 7th, to consider deferred matters.

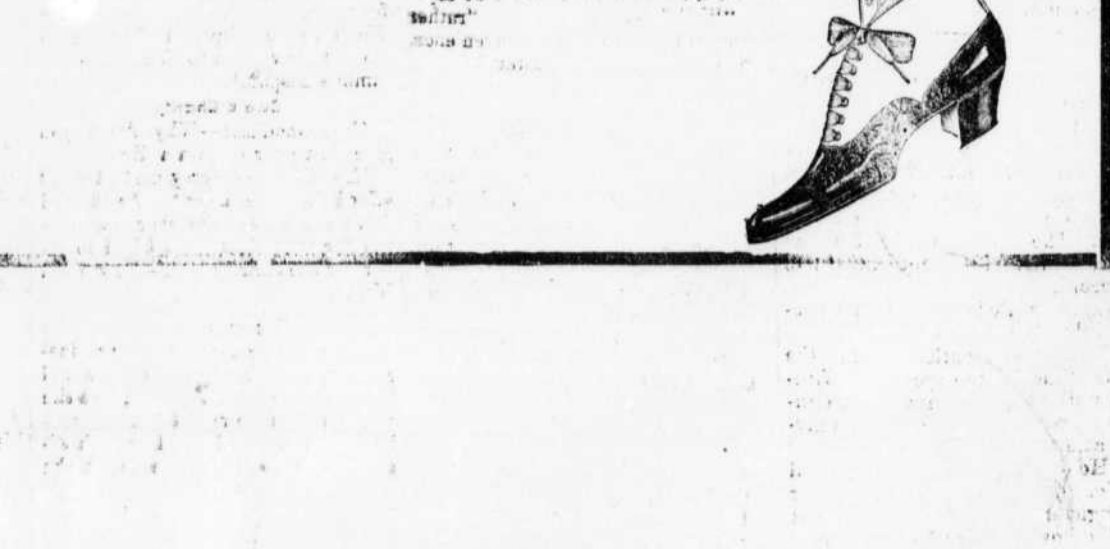

Salisbury Now Under Martial Law. Salisbury, N. C., Aug. 8.—Francis J. Cress, a well known citizen of Salisbury, was arrested to-day on the charge of leading the mob of lynchers here Monday night at the hands of which three men met death.

In view of current threats to liberate George Hall and others arrested for lynching the Whites negroes Monday night, the Rowan Rifles were called out by the State.

The city is now practically under martial law, and no one is allowed to enter either the jail or from the court house except by authority.

There is little prospect at this hour of serious trouble tonight, though the day has been one of excitement, every nerve is strung to the highest tension and a bloody conflict would follow the slightest provocation.
