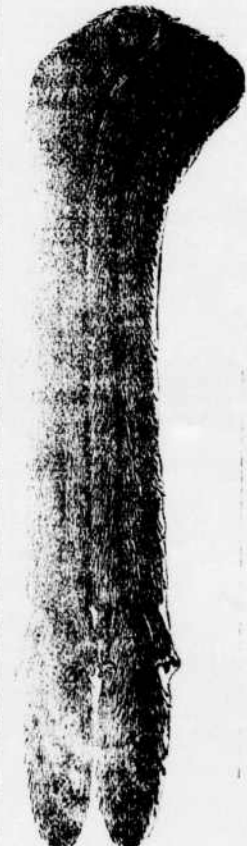

"THE UNITED STATES," HIS.

A Senator's Idea of the Presidential Form of Expression.

From the staid committee on revision of the laws, now at work in the capital, comes the first of these studies "lighter vein" which from time to time give Washington excuse to smile. The fact that the first of the vintage of the winter is "on the President" has not tended to make the snicker less audible. They were discussing the perennial question of the plurality or singularity of the phrase "United States of America." Division arose as ever. There were those who favored the "United States in its entirety," and others who demanded "in their entirety." The "its" and the "theirs" were at it hammer and tongs, and one distinguished Representative was warmly defending the collective singular view of the case. "The idea of the United States as a unity is the universal one," he declared, "and I think the time has come to drop plural pronouns and verb forms for 'the United States, their interests, navy, army, law, &c.' but 'the United,' and the like. "And," he concluded in a nothing-more-to-be-said tone, "I believe the President favors this view. "H-h-m-m-m," broke in a senator, "maybe so, but I thought Mr. Roosevelt was committed to 'the United States, its,' the United States, him, etc. It may be wrong." There was laughter ranging from Democratic guffaws to derisive Republican gurgles.—Washington Dispatch to The New York Times.

Inflated Values.

The South is experiencing an era of real prosperity and it would be a wicked soul, indeed, who could for a moment, wish it otherwise, for long enough has his great section of the country had its peculiar draw-backs in material prosperity. But is there not some danger that values may be set too high on certain things? It is well enough to bid down the spirit of speculation, but it is dangerous to the speculative spirit to get below the people at all. A steady growth with level dealing is the safest policy everywhere.—Portland Neck Commonwealth.

THE BAPTIST ASSIGNMENT

Washington, D. C., Dec. 4.—The North Carolina delegation in Congress is very anxious to secure the appointment of Representative John H. Small on the Committee on River and Harbors to succeed the late Mr. Lester of Georgia. Mr. Small is the choice of Minority Leader John Sharp Williams for the committee vacancy, which means that his appointment will be recommended to the speaker. Of course, the speaker, could veto choice of Mr. Williams, but this would be most unusual. There was significant action today by the River and Harbor Committee, which looks good for Mr. Small. The committee decided for the first time in its history to apportion the work of preparing the River and Harbor bill among the various members. Each member is made a sub-committee, and is to take up the river and harbor work by States. For instance, Mr. Sparkman of Florida, will look after the matters pertaining to the States of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia and Florida, and his recommendations will form the basis of the river and harbor bill for those States. The important fact is that Mr. Sparkman is the States of North Carolina and South Carolina on the list only temporarily, and the announcement is made that he will be taken in charge by the new member of the committee. As each member of the committee looks after his own State, it is to be inferred that the new appointee will be chosen from one of the Carolinas.—Raleigh News and Observer.

Rocky Mount, N. C., Dec. 5.—Great is Methodism in North Carolina. Conference reports show a year of unequalled achievement and in a year of unprecedented opportunity. He sounds the possibilities in the human breast, and doubt becomes evanescent before him like morning mists before the rising sun. He breaks the shackles of superstition and leads the faithful into the fulness of liberty in the Kingdom of God. Much of the day has been spent by the members in friendly conversation. In this is a cross fertilization of ideas which stimulates a nobler denominational sentiment, unifying the conference in spirit.

WATER LILY SEEDS AS FOOD.

People who feed on water lilies have recently been made the subject of a special study by government scientists. They are a tribe of Indians, native to southern Oregon and dwelling at the eastern foot of the Cascade mountains. "Klamath," they call themselves, and their harvest of the food in question is obtained from a vast shallow area of fresh water, 10,000 acres of which are covered in the summer time with "woks," as the plant that furnishes the crop is named.

The plant is a great yellow water lily, known to botanists as Nymphaea polysepala, and it seems to have furnished a staple food of the Klamath in primitive times. Living, as they do, on a government reservation, they are less dependent upon the crop for food than in former days, but it is still regarded by them as a delicacy. Not the flowers themselves, but the seeds are eaten, the seed pods being gathered in August by the women of the tribe, who use for the purpose queer looking dugout canoes, rowing the boats through the thickly growing lilies by means of poles.—Myerson's Magazine.
