It was not until the sixteenth century that the law was passed that the victor was to be allowed to slay his opponent.

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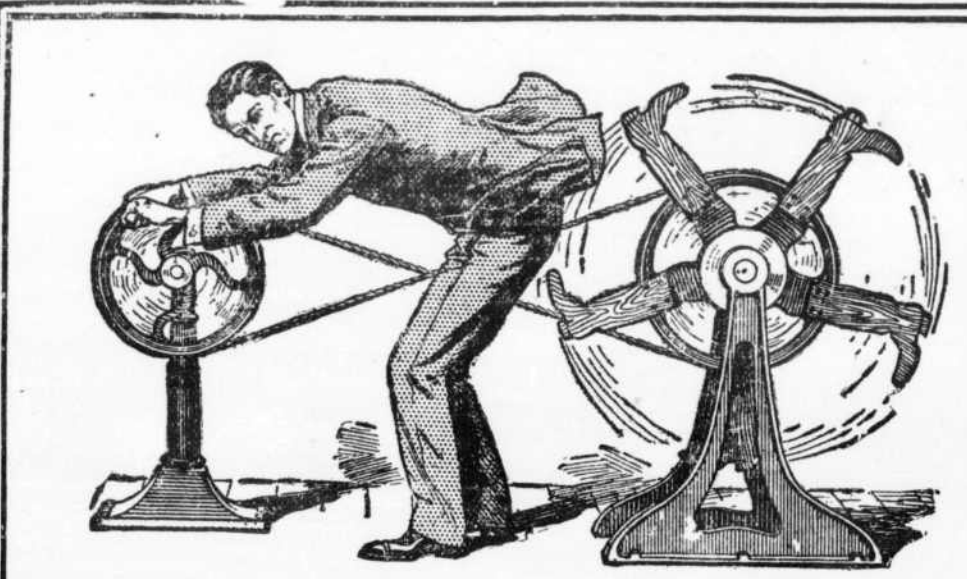
