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STRANGE FIND BY WORKMEN

TOWN MATTERS.

Proceedings of the Aldermen's Meeting Last Night

The board of aldermen met Thursday night in regular monthly session with six of the members present.

There was nothing out of the ordinary in the reports of the standing committees. The street committee reported that considerable work had been done on the streets and it was still in progress.

Complaint having been made that a building on Thirtieth street occupies a portion of the street, the mayor and street committee were instructed to investigate matter and report at next meeting of the board.

The several officers made their reports for the past month.

James Brown asked permission to move a building up Dickinson avenue from his lot near the intersection of Greene street to a lot near the depot. This being the busy season of the year when there is much hauling along that street to the tobacco market and depots, permission was not granted for the present.

There was considerable discussion of the action of the board at a recent meeting in clearing two extra policemen when one was thought to be sufficient. The matter ended in discussion and no action was taken.

L. C. Have a Big Day.

What do you think of a date being set for a big tobacco sale day and premiums being given to the farmer who comes to market from the greatest distance, to the one who receives the largest check for his sales, to the one who gets the highest price for a single lot, and so on. The Tobacco Board of Trade and the Chamber of Commerce might confer together about this. The Reflector believes our enterprising merchants would readily donate the necessary premiums, and such a day would be good for the tobacco market and for the business of the town.

The Smidtown Blockaders.

In Greensboro yesterday, Judge Boyd sentenced the nine Smithtown blockaders to terms in the penitentiary ranging from twelve months to fourteen months with \$100.

Many of these prisoners were accompanied by their wives and children, who had come down to be with them during their trial. It was a touching and pathetic scene in the court room when the sentence was passed. Judge Boyd, in sentencing them, said that he had made up his mind to exterminate the lawlessness of Smithtown and would be forced to impose a heavy penalty upon the guilty parties as an example.

First New Bill.

The first bale of new cotton for this season was brought in today by Tom Little, a colored man who is a tenant on the farm of Mr. W. J. Manning. The bale was bought by Speight & Co., at 13¢ and shipped to Martin & Son, of Petersburg. This cotton was in the best condition of any first bale that has been sold on this market for several years being apparently dry and free from gin cut. Tom Little has brought in the first bale each year for the last four years.
