Have you had your Christmas bills presented yet?

The streets need attention and ought to receive it, too.

Today is the time to bend our efforts towards something better, for the morrow never comes.

Come to think about it, we haven't heard of so many New Year resolutions being put up this year.

"Police probe report monkey killed girl." Headline. And pray, tell us what the monkey had to say about the charge.

A few of the prisoners that were allowed to go home on Christmas failed to return to their camps, and we can hardly blame them, either.

Colonel Grimes, it is claimed has grown stronger in Eastern Carolina since certain reports about his being detained were recently spread. We had expected as much.

The esteemed Associated Press is furnishing an abundance of copy about the Ford peace party. Report after report comes, each contradicting the previous one.

In order to keep up with the progress which the county is making, we are somewhat of the opinion that Greenville will have to begin to hustle a little right at this season.

The latest submarine outrage is the sinking of a French liner without warning. It seems that the Teutonic allies are just bound to follow up one depredation with another.

The Raleigh Times, edited by that brilliant fellow, Robert L. Gray, is getting a large number of bonnets thrown at it, and comes to think about it, the Times is due all of them.

The sympathy of the Reflector is extended to Mr. Shelburn and his family in the death of their son, Mr. John Shelburn. Mr. Shelburn was a mighty fine young man and held a responsible position in the employ of the United States government.

Of late it seems that the papers are filled with stories of murders and suicides. Every day this week the big State papers have been filled up with this kind of news. We do not know if it is true or not, but it seems that murders and suicides run in bunches. When one is committed four or five are sure to follow.

We share grief with the Charlotte Observer that the lawyers of this State should select some point outside of the State to hold their annual meeting. They should select some point in the North State where they are not liable to be led off the beaten track by evil influences. (The Virginian Pilot will please copy the above.)

NO ROOM FOR MORE TALK

Speaking of the second note to Austria, the Virginian Pilot gives the case in the best light of any we have seen.

Of the second note from the United States to Austria in re the sinking of the Ancona, an inspired report from Washington says that "while it carries a virtual reiteration of the original demands, it is somewhat less sharp in tenor than that which preceded it." The implication is, however, that it is "the last word of the American government on the subject."

"The Austrian reply to the first note was an emphatic denial of all the American contentions in the case and a flat refusal to comply with the specific requirements for satisfaction. In effect Washington had said: 'Here are our grievances; they can only be satisfied by prompt acknowledgement and full reparation.' In effect Austria responded: 'We do not acknowledge your right to complain, we endorse the acts of our agents in the premises, we owe and shall make neither apology nor reparation.'"

"If the authorities at Washington had meant to make the matter the subject of diplomatic discussion, with a view to ultimate concession and compromise, both the spirit and language of the first communication were calculated to produce a contrary impression. Indeed the document was

to all intents and purposes an ultimatum and should never have been sent unless the weight and purport of its wording had been fully weighed by the President and his advisers, and unless behind the incisive indelicacies and sharp presentation of alternatives resided a resolute purpose to stand by them. It were far wiser to begin with mild representations and polite petitions for voluntary measures of redress and later to meet insult and injustice with the open gambit of challenge than to start out as was done in the Lusitania case with denunciation and threat and then slip down to secret negotiations over issues already solemnly declared to be beyond the sphere of arbitration and open to but one settlement under the laws of God and humanity.

"There must be no repetition of this experience or the people of the United States will be forced to the conclusion that the foreign policies of the government are dictated by phrase-makers and opportunists rather than by statesmen clearly understanding the rights of the nation and calmly determined to maintain and to vindicate them against all trespassers. Respect for those rights abroad will not be enhanced by initial bluster and subsequent cooling down into placability by grudging and unsubstantial concessions against all humanity and avowing unalterable purpose to do all that may be necessary to punish their authors and put a stop to their commission were better thrown in the fire before sent to their destination unless they are going to be lived up to, 'come what may.' The sentiment of these compositions is lofty and their phrasing is perfect, but what are they more than tinkling cymbals and sounding brass if their force is to end with their promulgation and all their brave significance is to be frittered away in endless carrels and poor parlers leading nowhere and accomplishing nothing of the great objects professedly sought.

"A breach with Austria is to be seriously deprecated if it can be avoided without sacrifice of something of far greater value to the American nation than the preservation of superlatively friendly relations with any earthly power or potentate. Peace is a great boon to the children of men, but like all other mundane blessings, it can be purchased at too high a price. And it is a false gospel which teaches that the highest duty of a government is to preserve the peace of its people. The supremacy of truth and of right is of far more importance in this world than the avoidance of strife which is purchasable only by the triumph of wrong. Surrender to evil is not peace. The helmman of our ship of state of David Crockett: 'Be sure you're right, then go ahead.' No slowing down or change of course when the prow has already been pointed into the channels laid down in the charts of honor. The hand on the wheel must be firm and steady and the orders from the pilot-house to the engine-room must be prompt and consistent. There is no danger that President Wilson will lack full support from the people of the country in following to its logical conclusion the principles enunciated in his utterances on the Lusitania and Ancona cases. The one danger is that shallow motives of expediency shall be allowed to subject those principles to interminable debates behind the curtains of the chancelleries at Berlin and Vienna until they finally become adjourned questions for future accommodation." In that case nothing that the State Department may hereafter address to any foreign government will be taken seriously either in America or abroad. This is plain speaking, but it is the truth.

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
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
