Camp 27 Regt 104 Inf 2nd Div

My dear Sister

Your letter was received a few days ago. I was truly glad to hear from you. I have nothing of interest to write. Bill and myself are both well. We hear nothing from Lees army, but hear some times that he is falling back. I heard this morning that a part of his force had crossed over into Md again. I dont believe one word of it. I would not be surprised if he fell back to Gordonsville. I think we will have another big fight some time next month near Gordonsville and then the Yankee army will occupy the north side of the Rappahannock and we will hold the south side. I think every thing is looking very fair for peace just at this ^{time}. I think our whole army is in a much better condition than it ever has been in since

the war began. I know one thing
I wish the war would end I would
like to be at home very much I am
getting tired of the fun. I guess the
froshet in the river has ruined the
prospect ^{for} water melons. I dont see
I will get any this summer I dont
see any prospect of any up
here. This is a very poor and des-
olate country very few people live
near here. and I can assure you
we have to live rather hard. We get
meat and bread. and such things
as the commissary furnishes but
we cant buy any vegetables at all
I bought two little heads of cabages this
morning and had to pay one
dollar for them. Cucumbers two
dollars & a half for a dozen. Give
my love to all. Write soon.
