may ever tire me to do so & am well and am making out very  
well how glad I was when I got your letter that you do not do what  
a pleasure it is to me to hear from you you see you are far  
I had for got to see you but I have not and shall never forget  
you & would of written to you but I did not do so when you were  
in the hospital but if you will write to me I will  
sure you it shall not be so long no more & will write to you after  
I expected you had for gotten me Mack & have no more to write  
you you see that your old sweet hand had not got more well  
yet I expected he would of gone to see you a good while now you  
no he was mad with me a bout you kicking of him but you no  
I did not tell you to back him I expect he will go back to see  
you & hope he will have to go in this way get dont you or not  
Mack did you no that Fanny Gibbs was married she was not  
a man if hear else by her bro did you no old Mr. exorable  
was dead all these months exorable he died a few days ago Mack  
I saw a man about the other day for drinking and I would not  
be that to you now at the front branch you no it looks bad to see  
a man put to death he claps at his grave and his coffin and

I saw him march up to his grave and he shot by  
and look at it and then he march out a bout 10 steps and  
and he fel on his rear and they shot him to mor  
row & am going to see there others that you no it was  
dark had to see none shot do you think it is with arms  
& no if it was to die sent & should be shot & do not  
think & shot ever be shot marks if it was to die

go home & am as well as to stay in as long as  
a year there is to men be shot in the 17 reg  
ment the 17 regment has come back to  
Merrington & got a det. from brother to day  
but he did not say how George was & will write  
to him to day and I shall hear from him one  
man got wounded in an campy that was bob  
ear may be got wounded they got 90 kil and  
died they got a grate every elcting and any  
thing that was good to eat in the parkes  
early sleep I have not be to the regment  
in 9 months and I do not see when  
I shall go & hope I shall never go back no more

Maack This is written so bad & no you can not  
read it you must see over me for my bad writing  
When you write to me write me all the news  
Maack where do you live at you do not tell me if  
whether I write come by to see you or not be fore  
I go away I am coming in by to see you & want  
Maack do you ever think of the boys we have been  
to gether oh may that time come a game or no you  
I have forgot then we for I have not seen you in so  
long for Johni Blaw he has gone to come no more he  
has said the chief that we all are now may we  
fall down him every has gone the same way and  
then my name may go the same way most all  
the boys will get kill and the girls will be left  
a clamor & hope I had get alone and get home Maack  
you must not let the year but get you have  
glad I would be if I could see you but if we can not  
reach oth we can write to each other oh may  
we meet a game & no you will get tired trying to  
read this you must excuse me for writing you so long  
a checker I will come to a close good by write soon to
