he couldn't leave it at Petersburg & walk to him.
I think it is quite as safe and there will not
trouble any one to send it by express.

Pamki sends love to you and kisses
also. Write soon Dearest and tell me how
you like soldiering - say how to friends -
Write often you know but much to do,
and be assured your letters will ever be
the sweetest drops in the cup of your wife's
happiness in your absence - With many
good wishes for your comfort and happiness

Dearest

You may well imagine how
often I have thought of my dear
husband, since I received your letter
and how much I sympathize with
all soldiers - whether only playing
soldiers' or really encamped for
the war. This very cold weather is
unfavorable to out-door exercise or
labors of any kind and I pity you
Darling especially if you are com-
pelled to be exposed. I trust, however,
you will be prudent and try to keep
well. You spoke of your back being
a little sore - only having to ride out
occasionally; still you are
obliged to remain with the Regt. I am
glad you have a room instead of a tent -
I hope you will not do without any-

thing you need if you can get it.
Frankie is much opposed to your being
a Soldier. She ^{your letters,} much grieved
when, after reading ^I told her - her Papa
was a Soldier now. She exclaimed "he
is not a Soldier. I shan't let this
Gambrells have my Papa". Darling,
you see, your little family is ^{rather}
in favor of your accepting the furlough
offered you - unless you really prefer
taking a little experience in your
new business first. I am glad Green
^{& Polly} are improving - hope they may soon be
quite able to attend to their work - I
am sorry you lost your fences and trust
that Part & Green may both remain
well so as to be able to replace them.

We have been well since you were here
and neighbors are also well, I think.

We have had letters from Brothers Frank,
Jimmie & Henry. They were all well and

only complained of short rations.
Teller ^{sent} Henry a bag of provisions,
yesterday and has gone to Warren
this morning to express a box to Bud
Jimmie - & he intends going to Golds-
boro Saturday, so he will express one
to Brother Frank there. They are really
suffering - Brother Jimmie especially -
is now only getting three oz of meat
& one half lbs meal per day.

Dr Hicks will return to Salisbury
today or Saturday. George Hicks will
accompany him as far as Raleigh.

Capt Elias Shaw is at home on
furlough. They say he is very gray indeed.
Sir Joe and Mag spent yesterday at
Mrs Isham's - Mrs Deanes & two
daughters are still there. Denis Giddens
is ^{was} here yesterday - just called an
hour or two. He is at home on business
you know - will come again before
he returns to the Regt.
