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PURPOSE OF THE ORIENTATION PERIOD

FOR FRESHMAN

This is your introduction to college life and to this college campus as a student. We hope the introduction and subsequent associations here may be mutually pleasant and profitable. During the next three days we shall try to acquaint you with several features of college life. By learning these first lessons well, you may avoid inconvenience later and have greater satisfaction in your college experience.

To some there is a fairly wide gap between high school and college: the latter is more complex and exacting, it is less receptive to excuses, and it may expect a higher degree of skill in the various things you do.

This special period of three days is set apart for your introduction to college—to give you a chance to learn about certain routines, practices, requirements, duties, and privileges of a college student, while other students, except a few helpers remain away from the campus.

Do not hesitate to ask questions about anything that concerns your relationship to the college, the students, curricula, rules, etc. You are among sympathetic friends who were, likewise, freshmen just a few years ago.

FOR TRANSFER STUDENTS

This is your introduction to citizenship as a member of a new college community. Your success as a student depends largely on how well you make this adjustment. Dr. Orval L. Phillips, Registrar, is your special counsellor for adjustment to citizenship on this college campus. Please meet him as scheduled elsewhere in this program and consult him about your adjustment problems during the college year. He will be pleased to serve you at any time he is called upon.

INTRODUCTORY EXPLANATIONS

The college dormitories will be open on Monday, September 6; the college dining hall will be open to students for the evening meal.

Students arriving Tuesday morning should arrive not later than 8:30 A. M. in order to find their rooms and then be ready for the beginning of the official program at nine o'clock in the Wright Auditorium.

MAJORS AND MINORS

You may select from the catalog any curriculum that you may desire. One major or one minor must be selected from the following fields: English, Foreign Language, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies.

ADVISERS

Each student has an adviser whom he should feel free to consult on any matter connected with his college work and college attendance. Get acquainted with him at once and cultivate that acquaintance at every opportunity; he is here to help you and to serve you. You will find a list of the advisers by curricula in this bulletin.

Choose your majors carefully, for the curriculum in that major is the road map by means of which you will travel in search of education, certain skills appropriate to your native ability, and profitable employment after your college course is completed.

A.B. AND B.S. DEGREES

This college offers a general liberal arts degree (Bachelor of Arts) and the professional education curriculum leading to the Bachelor of Science degree. The Bachelor of Science degree will be awarded to those students who prepare for

teaching and the Bachelor of Arts degree for those who do not pursue the professional education curriculum. The Bachelor of Arts curriculum will not require the courses in education that qualify for the teacher's certificate. Consult your advisers for details concerning these two degrees.

Students desiring to enter certain professional fields other than education will be able to take at East Carolina College one to three years of work preparatory to entering colleges giving full curricula in those fields. Fields in which work is offered: pre-medical, pre-dental, laboratory technician, pre-nursing, pre-legal, dietetics, pre-engineering, two year curriculum in Forestry and two year curriculum in Agriculture.

EXTRA CURRICULAR SKILLS

It is advisable for a student to develop during his four years in college one or more specific skills that will add to his equipment as a teacher and enable him more readily to secure a teaching position. Superintendents and principals in a great many cases want a teacher of a particular subject who can also direct certain extra curricula activities such as, having charge of the library, directing a glee club, playing the piano, coaching one or more athletic sports, coaching dramatics, teaching public school music, and supervising school publications. The prospective teacher without one or more of these specific skills is often at a disadvantage in securing a teaching position. The most frequent calls for teachers with extra curricula skills are for teachers who can play the piano, direct public school music, and coach athletic sports.

ADMISSION-CLASSIFICATION-SCHOLARSHIP

ADMISSION

Students are admitted to East Carolina College on the basis of their record in the last school or college attended before making application for admission here. It is the applicant's responsibility to see that an official transcript from the last school or college he attended is sent to the Registrar of this college.

To be admitted the transcript should show:

- a. Graduation from a standard high school with a minimum of sixteen well organized high school units of work, or
- b. The equivalent of such training by the completion of sixteen acceptable units of high school work, or
- c. Attendance at another college with good standing and scholarship attained in accordance with the following statement:

To be admitted, the applicant's transcript must show satisfactory grades, and he must be eligible otherwise for readmission to the college last attended.

Students generally earn about:

49 quarter hours of credit the first or freshman year,

- 98 quarter hours by the end of the second or sophomore year,
- 147 quarter hours by the end of the third or junior year,
- 190 quarter hours by the end of the fourth or senior year.

CLASSIFICATION

Students are classified according to the number of quarter hours of college credit they have earned as shown below:

- a. Freshmen—0 to 47 quarter hours of credit.
- b. Sophomores—48 to 95 quarter hours of credit.
- c. Juniors—96 to 143 quarter hours of credit.
- d. Seniors—144 or more quarter hours of credit.
