Courses and Changes Approved by the University Undergraduate Curriculum Committee On January 13, 1970 And January 27, 1970

Mathematics 219i: Teaching Elementary Mathematics (3)

2 hours lecture and 2 hours laboratory per week Prerequisites: Math $127,128,129$, and at least junior standing Catalog description: Presents modern techniques and methods of teaching mathematics in grades 4-9. Laboratory work provides deeper understanding of mathematical concepts and experiences with materials and methods appropriate for classroom use.

Mathematics 200: Introduction to Digital Computation (4)
3 hours lecture and 2 hours laboratory per week
Prerequisite: Math 65 or 165
Catalog description: Includes analysis, automatic programming, and coding. Elementary problems will be written and actually run on the machine by all students. These problems may be related to the student's major, but a multitude of simple mathematical problems is available, which could serve to reinforce the students' general education in mathematics. (Mathematics majors cannot receive credit for this course and Business 151)

Physics 15, 16, 17: Laboratory for General Physics (1 each) (Formerly Physics 115, 116, 117) (renumbered)

Physics 25, 26, 27: General Physics (3 each) (Formerly Physics $125,126,127$ ) (renumbered)

Art portfolio requirement to become an art major (for details consult the School of Art)

Memo to: Vice President Fobert L. Holt and members of the University Curriculun Comittee

From: Special General Education Committee

This is a report of a comittee appointed on September 26 by Vice President Holt to review the General Education requirements and to recommend any changes needed to the Curriculum Committee.

The Committee unanimously presents and recommends the following proposed General Education course requirements as a program of study for all baccalaureate candidates. The Comittee has made an effort not to include any courses as a requirement specifically for the purpose of particular major or professional preparation. The number of hours of general education has been so reduced that schools and departments may make specific supportive or cognate requirements and still allow the student some free electives.

The Committee nakes its recomendetions with the following assumed conditions: (1) that there be no additional hours added to current course totals in the major or minor; (2) that departments will recomend to the Curriculum Conmittee particular supportive and cognate requirements for their degree programs and make an effort to afford as many free elective hours as possible to the student. (The History Department may, for example, specify completion of Language 4 as a cognate requirement for the B.S. in history where it previously was a general education requirement, but such cognate requirenents must be submitted to the Curriculum Committee.) (3) Mathematics $127,128,129$ and Science 38,39 , and 239 are open only to those intending to major in elementary and special education.
