FACULTY SENATE MINUTES


February 16, 1971

The Faculty Senate met on Tuesday, February 16, 1971 at 3:00 P.M. in Room 103, Biology Building. The Chairman called the meeting to order and asked for corrections to the minutes of the January 19, 1971 meeting of the Senate. There were none, and the Chairman ruled that the minutes were accepted as presented. The roll of the Senate was checked with the following members absent: Hursey, Aliapoulios, Kinzie, Johnson, Kendrick, Cullop, Hurley, Rees, Pritchard, McGrath, Bailey, Ball and Gibbons.

SPECIAL ORDER OF THE DAY

The Chairman stated that the meeting scheduled for April 13th would be held April 20th instead and that the Agenda Committee would meet on April 6th. The reason for the change was that the University would not be in session on April 13th.

The Chairman then made an announcement for the Credits Committee, "As directed by the Faculty Senate on November 10, 1970, the Credits Committee is now in the process of considering a pass-fail undergraduate course participation system and is soliciting proposals for such a system. Please send your concrete proposals to Dr. K. J. Davis of the Mathematic Department by March 15, 1971."



There was no unfinished business to be brought before the Senate.

REPORT OF COMMITTEES

The Chairman stated that Mr. Robert Ussery would present the Evaluation of Sophomore Level Classroom Attendance Factors Report. The report was of informational nature only and required no action; however, after the report was presented the Chairman stated that the Senate had tabled the Recommended Changes in Class Attendance Regulations (See attached to January 19th Agenda) until this report could be heard and if there were no objections, this would be treated as a motion to postpone until this time. There were no objections and the floor was opened for discussion. Miss Lowry moved that attendance for all students be left up to the individual instructor. Mr. Crawley seconded the motion. Mr. Crawley stated that the Art Department would like to control its own class attendance. Mr. Kim stated that the report (Mr. Ussery's) did not prove there was any difference in grades. He pointed out that since no attendance patterns were studied, the report

did not make a meaningful statement about grade change.

He stated that since the data was on matched instructors, it was possible that the instructor graded the same and would hence account for no significant difference.

He noted that significant difference and academic difference were two separate things and that it might be good to take a look at any academic difference in this regard. He suggested there was danger in reading too much into the Committee's report.



Mr. Ussery replied: Since the t-test did not result in the rejection of the null-hypothesis, the implication was that any difference observed would be attributable to chance alone. The report did not proport to serve as proof of no difference at all between the grades in question, but indicated no statistically significant difference between the means of the set of class averages Fall 1969, and Fall 1970.

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Mr. Grossnickle brought the discussion back to the motion on the floor and said he was opposed to unlimited cuts for freshman. He further suggested that

Miss Lowry's motion, if passed, would put undue pressure on the individual instructor. Mr. Ferrell asked what provision the proposal made for excusing absences from unannounced quizzes. After additional discussion by McDaniel, Kim and Crawley, Miss Lowry withdrew her motion and Mr. Crawley withdrew his second to the motion.

Mr. Lambeth made a motion that the recommended Class Attendance Regulations proposal be adopted; the motion was seconded by Bellis. There was further discussion by McDaniel, Ferrell, Douglas, Bellis, and Giles. Mr. Lambeth then made a motion that the word "preferably" be left out of item number 2 of the proposal, which read "this policy, along with the instructors requirements for announced quiz attendance, should be presented to the class, preferably in writing . . . " . The motion was seconded by Bellis. The motion was voted on, and did not pass. Mrs. Ellenberg then moved to amend the motion by deleting in its entirety item number 3 of the proposal. This motion was seconded by Mr. Grossnickle. Mr. Adler then raised the question as to what was contained in item number 3. It was suggested that this be read. Mr. Bellis then read item 3 to the Senate. The question was called, voted on, and passed. The Chairman then stated that the motion on the floor was to

accept the amended (item number 3 omitted) proposal. The motion was voted on and passed. (Revised Class Attendance Regulations Attached)

The question was then raised as to when the rule would go into effect. Mr. Ferrell stated unless otherwise specified the rule would go into effect immediately. Mr. Romita made a motion that the rule go into effect Tuesday, February 16, at 3:40 p.m. Mr. Ferrell seconded the motion. Mr. Woodside noted that the Senate at its September 22, 1970 meeting had specified rules for the Winter Quarter, and that the University was now operating under these rules. Further, he noted that it would be impractical to attempt to notify the faculty of the change before the end of the Winter Quarter. Mr. McAllister stated that the change should be done at the first of the quarter. Mr. Ferrell then withdrew his second and the motion was not before the assembly. Mr. Crawley made a motion that the rule go into effect at the first of Spring Quarter, 1971. Mr. Douglas seconded the motion. The motion was voted on and passed.

Mr. Grossnickle then presented the question concerning lab courses in the General Education Science requirements. (See the February 4, 1971 minutes of the Curriculum

Committee). After discussion by Grossnickle, Ellis, McAllister, Ragan, Crawley, Ferrell, Hester, Horne and others, and after several motions had been put forward only to be withdrawn, Mr. Snyder made a motion that it is the intent of the Senate that the customary laboratory credit should be required as a part of the Science Course selected and that the Curriculum Committee is authorized to make such revisions in the stated Curriculum requirements as are necessary to implement this intent. The motion was seconded by Lambeth. The motion was voted on and passed.

NEW BUSINESS

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A Report of Information and Statistics on the Freshman Class and Transfers into the University was presented by Dr. Horne. There were questions asked by Lowry and Ferrell. (A copy of the report is attached).


It was noted at this time that it appeared that the Senate lacked a quorum. The


CLASS ATTENDANCE REGULATIONS AS REVISED


BY FACULTY SENATE ON FEBRUARY 16, 1971

1. Students are expected to attend punctually all lecture and laboratory sessions in the course for which they are registered, beginning with the first session following registration in the course, except as provided in number 2 below.

- 2. Each instructor shall determine the class attendance policy he feels is best for his particular course. In determining the number of unexcused absences which he will accept, the instructor should consider carefully the nature of his course, the maturity level of the students enrolled, and the consequent degree of flexibility which his policy will include. This policy, along with the instructor's requirements for announced quiz attendance, should be presented to the class, preferably in writing, at the beginning of the quarter and will govern attendance in the class.
- 3. Instructors are expected to recognize and honor official university excuses, i.e., excuse students without penalty for absences due to

participation in authorized university activities, death in the family, and personal illness of students excused by the infirmary staff. Verification of these authorized absences, except death in the family, may be obtained by contacting the offices of the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women.







- 2. First-time Transfers






PROFILE FOR CLASS OF 1974

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


