RE: Proposed Calendar 1972-1973

For some time the Calendar Committee has studied ways to improve the Academic calendar. After much thought and preparation, we do, herein, send to the Faculty Seante this calendar proposal for a semester system beginning fall, 1972.

Our calendar is modeled closely after the calendars used at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, North Carolina State University, and Duke University.

For many years semester systems have been associated with Saturday classes. The calendars at UNC, NCSU, and Duke do not include Saturday classes; equally our proposed calendar is predicated on a five-day week...no Saturday classes. We have asked several chairmen to help us show graphically that a five-day week is workable. The following chairmen have submitted such proof: Biology, Dr. Graham Davis; Geology, Dr. Ray Jennings; German and Russian, Dr. Henry Wanderman; History, Dr. Herbert Paschal; Political Science, Dr. William Troutman; Psychology, Dr. C. R. Prewett; Sociology and Anthropology, Dr. Melvin Williams; Romance Languages, Dr. Joseph Fernandez; The School of Business, Dr. Charles L. Broome, Assistant Dean; The School of Music, Dr. Paul A. Aliapoulios, Assistant Dean. Indeed, Dr. Davis of Biology has just completed a detailed semester schedule including all classes offered and teaching assignments. (Letters from these persons are on file in the Faculty Senate Office)

It has not been the intent of the Calendar Committee to prove the pros and cons of the semester system versus the quarter system. Those persons who are interested in previous studies are directed to the Faculty Senate office where such studies are available.

It has been the intent of the Calendar Committee to provide East Carolina University with the best possible workable calendar. This we believe the proposed calendar to be. Two compact semesters are provided without unduly long vacations to hinder academic progress.

The lengthy Christmas break enables faculty and students uninterrupted time to attend conferences, travel to distant libraries, finish research papers, etc. The final examination periods are long enough to give students sufficient time for adequate preparation; furthermore, only two exams are given per day. As in the past there will be two sessions of summer school. Lastly, with reduction of three registration and examination periods to two, we believe our proposed calendar would be beneficial to all.
