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PROPOSED SUMMER CALENDAR FOR 1977

April 4-8

Pre-registration for Summer Session
and Fall Quarter

The First Summer Term consists of 4½ weeks. Three hour courses meet 70 minutes and five hour courses meet 105 minutes. There are no Saturday classes. In order to accommodate certain students, various Departments will wish to offer some shorter courses. It is recommended that shorter courses in the first summer term originate on Monday, June 13th whenever possible. Final examinations for regular session courses will be given on the scheduled examination day. For classes not meeting on Friday, final examinations will be given on the last regularly scheduled class day.

The Second Summer Session consists of 4 weeks. Three hour courses meet 80 minutes and five hour courses meet 120 minutes. There are no Saturday classes. In order to accommodate certain students, various Departments will wish to offer some shorter courses. It is recommended that shorter courses originate on Monday, July 11 whenever possible. Final examinations for regular session courses will be given on the scheduled examination day. For classes not meeting on Friday, final examinations will be given on the last regularly scheduled class day.

All students expecting to initiate work in the summer or return following an absence of one or more quarters must complete application for admission at least two weeks before registration.

A student may not enter a course later than the third meeting of a Summer Session class and receive credit. During the first ten days, an undergraduate student may withdraw or drop a course without receiving grades for courses for which he is enrolled. After the first ten days, an undergraduate student withdrawing from school shall receive a grade of F for all classes which he is failing at that time unless, in the judgment of the Provost, Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs, or Dean of Continuing Education, as appropriate, the failures were caused by circumstances beyond the student's control. After this time, an undergraduate student may drop a course only due to unforeseeable and uncontrollable circumstances and only with the permission of the Provost, Vice Chancellor for Health Affairs or Dean of Continuing Education.

Applications for graduation in a given term must also be made within the three day entrance period.

First Term

3 Mondays, 5 Tuesdays, 5 Wednesdays, 5 Thursdays, 4 Fridays = 22 class days + 1 day registration + 1 day final exam = 24 days total.

Charge of Facilities Planning and Development Committee

Campus Facilities Planning and Development Committee - 7 faculty members plus 3 student members appointed by S.G.A. and ex-officio, Vice Chancellor for Business Affairs.

The Campus Facilities Planning and Development Committee shall meet regularly with appropriate university officials and advise them of university community interests regarding esthetics, landscape, space utilization, building location, traffic and parking, and other pertinent areas. The committee shall report to and seek the recommendation of the Faculty Senate on the above matters at least every fourth Senate meeting.

The chairman may ^{appoint} ~~select~~ subcommittees to ^{study} ~~treat~~ specific areas; ^{he shall select members,} ~~coopting for their~~ professional competence, ^{chosen for their professional competence, from the university community,} individuals from the university community. The subcommittees will be chaired by members of the standing committee.

EUGENE RYAN RESOLUTION

WHEREAS one reason for the change to the semester system at East Carolina University is that it will permit better coordination of our programs with those on the other campuses of The University of North Carolina; and

WHEREAS most courses in the Colleges of Arts and Sciences at those other campuses are three semester hour courses; and

WHEREAS three semester hour courses are generally more desirable than two semester hour courses for both pedagogical and administrative reasons;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that it is the sense of the Faculty Senate that the majority of undergraduate courses in the College of Arts and Sciences be permitted to be three semester hour courses.
