## 1. Name: Admissions Comuittee

2. Membership: 7 faculty members, 2 alternate faculty members, and 1 student member. Elected merbers must agree to serve at certain times when the University is not in session. Alternate members are appointed to facilitate meeting at these times. Ex officio members are: Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, Director of Admissions, and the Dean of Continuing Education, or their appointed representatives.
3. Quorum: 4 elected members
4. A. Committee Functions:
5. The Comittee is concerned with matters related to the admission and readmission to regular sessions and to the summer sessions for entering students and transfer students;
6. The Committee recommends policies and procedures governing undergraduate admissions and readmission to regular sessions and to the summer sessions;
7. The Committee recommends policies regulating the 30 semester hour residence requirement for graduation.
8. The committee serves as an appeals board for students who for sufficient reasons cannot meet admission requirements.
9. The Comittee reviews proposals regarding standards and requirements for admission to and retention in degree programs.
B. To Whom Committee Reports:

The Committee makes its recommendations of policies and procedures governing admissions pertaining to academic regulations and residence requirements for degree programs to the Faculty Senate.
C. How Often The Committee Reports:

The Committee reports to the Faculty Senate on the academic composition of the freshman class; transfer students, and retention rates at least once a year, and reports other times as necessary.
D. Power of the Committee to Act:

The Committee is empowered to make decisions regarding student appeals. The Committee suggests to the Director of Admissions such research studies as are helpful for evaluation of the efficiency of current practices.

1. Name: University Curriculum Comittee
2. Membership: 11 Eaculty members and two student members, and ex officio the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs or an appointed representative.
3. Quorum: 7 elected faculty members
4. A. Committee Functions:

The University Curriculum Comitree is concerned with undergraduate courses and progratns. It has the responsibility of assuring the high quality of course offerings. It reviews requests for permission to plan new degree programs and reports on lts review to the Conmittee on Educational Pollcies and Planning. The Comittee reviews and presents to the Faculty Senate for its approval:

1. Policies for determining the acceptability of prograns and courses;
2. New courses and program proposals and modifications of existing prograns presented to the Committee by the academic units;
3. Proposals regarding changes in the general education requirements presented to it by the General College Commttee;
4. Pollctes for the proposal of new courses and prograns and for the banking and deletion of courses and prograns; and
5. Proposals regarding changes in the toacher education requirements presented to $i t$ by the Teacher Education Committee.
B. To Whom the Commttee Reports:

The Comittee reports to the Faculty Senate. It reports on requests for permission to plan new degree programs to the Commttee on Educational Policies and Plamning.
C. How Often the Committee Reports: The Commttee reports to the Faculty Senate as often as necessary, but at: least once a year.
D. Power of Committee to Act:

The Committee is empowered to make recommendations to the Faculty Senate in curriculum matters in 4.A.

1. Name: Committee for Teaching Effectiveness
2. Membership: 10 faculty members and 3 student members, plus ex officio: Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs or an appointed representative, Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Dean of one undergraduate professional school. The Deans of the undergraduate professional schools shall rotate from year to year in alphabetical order of their schools. All faculty members shall serve three-year terms staggered so that no more than one-third of the members shall be elected annually. The student members and the Deans of undergraduate professional schools shall serve one-year terms.
3. Quorum: 6 elected faculty members exclusive of ex officio.
4. A. Committee Functions:

The Committee for Teaching Effectiveness is concerned with the identification and development of faculty teaching effectiveness and with the promotion of teaching excellence. As a means of encouraging improved teaching effectiveness, the committee is charged with the responsibility of studying and developing methods and procedures for the identification of teaching excellence through programs such as surveys of student and collegial opinion. The committee shall assist units requesting aid in developing teaching evaluation instruments for personnel decisions and, when requested, shall assist individual faculty members in improving their teaching effectiveness. The committee is empowered to recommend the recipients of the annual Alumni Association teaching awards.
B. To Whom Committee Reports:

The committee makes its recommendation of policies and procedures governing teaching excellence to the Faculty Senate.
C. How Often the Committee Reports:

The committee reports to the Faculty Senate as often as necessary, but at least once a year.
D. Power of the Committee to Act:

The committee is empowered to request assistance from the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs for the promotion of teaching excellence.

Whereas, there is not a stable, continuing source of funds for institutional scholarships and other student financial aid;

Whereas, the student financial aid picture is changing rapidly with anticipated financial ald funds from federal and other sources decreasing;

Therefore, be it resolved, that the Faculty Senate encourage the University to develop, possibly through a scholarship endowment, a stable, consistent source of funds for student scholarships.

The minutes of September 28,1981 , were approved as distributed.
Professor Richard Mauger, Geology Department, presented changes in the cognate science requirements (p. 170 for the B.S. Degree in Geology). The change would reduce the cognate science requirements for the degree program by $8 \mathrm{~s} . \mathrm{h}$. He requested to eliminate the B.A. degree in Geology since very few students are enrolled in the program, and with the approval of the changes in cognate requirements for the B.S., the two programs would differ substantively. On a motion by Boyce and seconded by Holt, the two requested changes in Geology passed. Holt moved that the Geology Minor be made available to both B.S. and B.A. degrees. Moore seconded, and the motion passed.

Professor Robert Christian, Department of Biology, presented the new course proposal, BIOL 5260, 5261, Microbial Ecology. Moore moved to accept the course, $0^{\prime}$ Rear seconded and the motion passed.

# UNIVERSITY CURRICULUM COMMITTEE MINUTES 

October 26, 1981

The University Curriculum Committee met on October 26, 1981, in Brewster B-103 at 3:00 p.m. Members present: Grossnickle, Boyce, Leahy, Holt, Daugherty, Cain, Broadhurst, Moore. Members absent: $0^{\prime}$ Rear, Hamilton, and ex officio members Brewer and Johnson. Hancock was out of town on University business.

The minutes of October 12,1981 , were read and corrected by noting Hancock as being absent. The minutes were approved as corrected.

Professor Frank Arwood and Mabel Laughter, Elementary Education, School of Education and Professor Richard Warner, Dean, presented the course proposals ELEM 1032, Reading as a Language Process, ELEM 1033, Reading Skills for Academic Study, and ELEM 1034, Reading for Appreciation and Evaluation, for reconsideration by the Committee. These courses had previously been approved with the proviso that the credit hours cannot be counted toward degree requirements (see Minutes of September 28, 1981). Professor Leahy moved to table the reconsideration of ELEM 1032,1033 , and 1034 and recommended that the Credits Committee examine the question of allowing certain type of credit toward degree programs. Professor Holt seconded the motion and the motion carried.

Professor Bob Gantt, Department of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Safety presented PHYE 1051, Beginning Gymnastics and PHYE/PRC 1060, Introduction to Sailing. PHYE/PRC 1060 would be cross listed on page 190 of the current University Catalogue. The course will be offered Fall and/or Spring Semester (I,C. on course proposal). Professor Boyce moved to accept the course, Holt seconded, and the motion passed.

Professor A1 King, Department of Health, Physical Education, Recreat1on and Safety presented DRED 3210, 3211, Motorcycle Safety Instructor Preparation. Professor Leahy moved to accept the new course, Topper seconded, and the motion passed.

Captain Steven Bienstock, Department of Aerospace Studies, presented the proposed changes in the Aerospace Studies cognate minor. He stated the changes were necessary since many of the courses presently listed under the cognate minor were no longer offered. Professor Cain moved to accept the revisions, Daugherty seconded, and the motion passed.

Professor Robert Muzzarelli, Speech, Language and Auditory Pathology, School of Allied Health and Social Professions, presented a revision of the SLAP BA/BS Minor (page 280 University Undergraduate Catalogue). Professor Holt moved to approve the new minor, Cain seconded, and the motion passed.

Professors G. Fox and Jean Huryn, Department of Sociology and Anthropology, presented ANTH 4000, 4001, Selected Topics in Anthropology and SOCI 4000, 4001, Selected Topics in Sociology. The Committee corrected the course proposals by noting under I.B. Credit hours are 3 semester hours for each course.

Professors Fox and Huryn requested an increase in credit hours for SOCI 4345, Racial and Cultural Minorities and SOCI 5343, Society and the Individual from the present 2 semester hours to 3 semester hours per course. It was noted that for SOCI 5343 the prerequisite listed only SOCI 2110 (page 255 in University Catalogue). The Committee noted that the change in hours for SOCI 4345 would effect the B.S. degree in Urban and Regional Planning (page 163) and this change had not been discussed with the Chair of Geography.

Professor Boyce moved to accept the courses SOCI 4000, 4001 and ANTH 4000, 4001 as amended. Professor Broadhurst seconded, and the motion passed. Professor Daugherty moved to accept the change in hours for SOCI 5343. Boyce seconded and the motion passed. Professor Daugherty moved to table SOCI 4345 until the Department coordinates the change in hours with all affected degree programs. Professor Cain seconded and the motion passed.

B. To Whom Committee Reports:

The committee makes its recommendations of policies and procedures governing funding of grants to the Faculty Senate.
C. How Often Committee Reports:

The Committee reports to the Faculty Senate at least annually the number of grant applications received and the number recommended for funding including the name of the recipient, department or school, grant title and the dollar amount of the grant.
D. Power of the Conmietee to Act

The Conmittee is empowered to make recommendations to the Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs concerning funded projects to improve teaching.
