

CURRICULUM COMMITTEE  
Minutes

January 24, 1985

The Curriculum Committee met January 24, 1985, at 1:30 p.m. in Brewster B-103. Members present were: McMillan, Daugherty, Grossnickle, Broadhurst, Wease, Ziehr, Hancock, Templeton, Topper, and Cain (ex officio). Members absent were: Muller, Boyce, and Briley (student).

The minutes were approved as written.

Grossnickle moved to remove from the Curriculum Bank DNCE 4072, Contemporary Dance VII (3), and DNCE 4082, Contemporary Dance VIII (3). McMillan seconded and the motion passed.

McMillan moved to approve the revised catalogue description for ENGL 1200, Composition (3) as presented by the Department of English. Templeton seconded. The motion passed.

The courses from the School of Art were postponed since there was no representative present.

Professors Kathryn Kolasa and Edward Markowski presented the proposal of the School of Home Economics to revise the Food, Nutrition and Institution Management major (CUP option) and the Child Development and Family Relations Major; to add new courses HOME 2109, Nutrition and Weight Control (1); HOME 3226, 3227, Advanced Normal Nutrition I, II (3,2); HOME 3394, Management of Food Quantity Production and Purchasing Lab (1), HOME 4315, 4316, Clinical Nutrition Through the Life Cycle (5,0); HOME 4318, 4319, Professional Dietetics Practice (12,0); HOME 4358, Nutrition Education Laboratory (0); HOME 5420, Family Intervention Models (3); and to delete HOME 4334, 4335, 4344, 4345, Clinical Dietetics II, III. Broadhurst moved to approve the proposal as amended. Boyce seconded. The motion passed.

Professors Emilie Henning, Hazel Aslakson, Eunice Messler and Mary Jane Brewer of the School of Nursing presented the proposed change in the B.S. Nursing degree and the courses NURS 2400, Introduction to Health Assessment (3); NURS 2500, Nursing of Well Adults (3); NURS 2501, Practicum in Nursing of Well Adults (2); NURS 2600, Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (5); NURS 2601, Practicum in Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (2); NURS 3050, Nursing Core I (2); change hours of NURS 3100 to 5 s.h., change title and prerequisites of NURS 3100 and 3101, change hours and prerequisites of NURS 3300, 3301, 4000, 4001; new course NURS 4050, Nursing Care II (3); change corequisites for NURS 4200; change hours and corequisites for NURS 4201; change hours and prerequisites for NURS 4400, 4401; delete NURS 2200, 2201, 2300, 2301. It was noted that SOCI 3213, 3214 were to be required and that these two courses used the computer. Therefore, with the additional number of students it would be helpful to know if the Computing Center had been contacted. Professor James Mitchell of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Economics was present and went on record by saying that the Computing Center had been contacted and that there was no problem. Due to the considerable change in the Nursing degree, concern was expressed that a student might be caught in the change and not be able to graduate. Dean Henning stated that no student will be caught by the change. Broadhurst moved to approve the proposal as amended. Templeton seconded. The motion passed.

The motion passed.

Professors Edith Hentag, Hazel Aalaaen, Eunice Messler, and Mary Jane [unclear] of the School of Nursing presented the proposed change in the B.S. Nursing degree and the courses NURS 200, Introduction to Health Assessment (1); NURS 2500, Nursing of Well Adults (3); NURS 2501, Practice in Nursing of Well Adults (2); NURS 2502, Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (2); NURS 2503, Research in Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (2); NURS 3020, Nursing Core I (2); change hours of NURS 3100 to 5 a.h., change title and prerequisites of NURS 3100 and 3101; change hours and prerequisites of NURS 3300, 3301, 4000, 4001; new course NURS 4000, Nursing Care II (1); change co-requisites for NURS 4200; change hours and co-requisites for NURS 4201; change hours and prerequisites for NURS 4400, 4401; delete NURS 2500, 2501, 2502, 2503. It was noted that SOCI 2213, 2214 were to be required and that these two courses and the computer tutorials with the additional number of students would be helpful to know if the Center for Learning had been contacted. Professor James Mitchell of the Department of Sociology, Anthropology and Economics was present and went on record by stating that the Computing Center had been contacted and that there was no problem. Due to the considerable change in the Nursing degree, concern was expressed that a search might be needed in the change and not be able to graduate. Dean Bennett stated that no student will be exempt by the change. The motion passed.

E. Food, Nutrition, and Institution Management Major:  
Coordinated Undergraduate Program Option

A minimum grade point average of 2.5 is required before a student can enter the Coordinated Program as a junior.

Required HOME courses: (Child Development and Family Relations) 3002; (Clothing and Housing) 1180 or ART 1001; (Home Economics Education) 2290; (Food, Nutrition and Institution Management) 1005, 1006, 2105, 2350, 3226, 3227, 3250, 3330, 3331, 3393, 3394, 4312, 4313, 4314, 4315, 4316, 4318, 4319, 4328, 4329, 4357, 4358, 5303, 5304, 5335, 5355, 5356; (Home Economics) 3000 . . . . . 69-70 s.h.
3. Required cognate courses: CHEM 2650, 2651; BIOL 2110, 2111, 2130, 2131 . . . . . 14 s.h.
4. Electives to complete requirements for graduation.

H. Child Development and Family Relations Major

Minimum degree requirement is 126 s.h. of credit as follows:

1. General education requirements (see Section 6, The General College: REQUIREMENTS FOR BACCALAUREATE DEGREE PROGRAMS) including cognate courses: PSYC 1050, 2101, 2102, MUSC 3018; MATH 1065 . . . . . 44 s.h.
2. Required HOME courses: (Child Development and Family Relations) 1103, 2200, 2201, 2202, 3002, 3203, 4306, 4308, 4994, 4995, 5313; (Food, Nutrition, and Institution Management) 2105; (Clothing and Housing) 1180, 1181; (Home Economics Education) 2126 or 2290; (Home Economics) 3000 . . . . . 38 s.h.
3. Minor or 24 s.h. of approved concentration or 12 s.h. each from two

adviser-approved supporting areas . . . . . 24 s.h.

4. Electives to complete requirements for graduation.

- HOME 2109 Nutrition and Weight Control (1)  
1 hour per week lecture; (3 hours per week fitness activity--2 hours as PHYE corequisite plus 1 hour documented fitness)  
Prerequisites: 20% above ideal weight, permission of instructor and 1 semester hour PHYE corequisite (as specified by the two departments)  
Course covers current information on sound nutritional principles in weight loss programs and explores physical fitness aspects of weight control.
- HOME 3226 Advanced Normal Nutrition I (3)  
Prerequisites: HOME 2105; CHEM 1150, 1151; 1160, 1161; BIOL 2130, 2131.  
A study of macronutrient processes at the cellular level, interrelationship of those nutrients, body composition, evaluation of macronutrient status and needs.
- HOME 3227 Advanced Normal Nutrition II (2)  
Prerequisites: HOME 2105, 3226; CHEM 1150, 1151; 1160, 1161; BIOL 2130, 2131.  
A study of vitamin and mineral processes at the cellular level, interrelationships of vitamin and minerals, evaluation of micronutrient status and needs.
- HOME 3394 Management of Food Quantity Production and Purchasing Lab (1)  
Three hours per week.  
Prerequisites: HOME 2350; HOME 3393 Required Corequisite  
Skill development in the management of food service operations. Sanitation, safety, maintenance of records and financial management are emphasized.
- HOME 4315, 4316 Clinical Nutrition Through the Life Cycle (5,0)  
Two hours per week lecture, nine hours per week laboratory  
Prerequisites: HOME 4312, 4313, 4314  
Supervised experience in clinical dietetics emphasizing planning, organizing and executing nutritional care plans for persons at various stages in the life cycle. Settings for the experience will be acute care hospitals, extended care facilities, private clinics and community health centers.
- HOME 4318, 4319 Professional Dietetics Practice (12, 0)  
Three hours per week lecture, 27 hours per week laboratory  
Prerequisites: HOME 4312, 4313, 4314, 4315, 4316.  
Provides the student an opportunity to practice skills and techniques and to apply knowledge and theories in a real life setting under the guidance and supervision of the faculty advisor and/or clinical advisor. Intensive practical experience in filling the roles of a dietician.
- HOME 4358 Nutrition Education Laboratory (0)  
Three hours per week laboratory  
Prerequisites: HOME 2105; HOME 5335 Required Corequisite  
Practical application of teaching-learning process to nutrition education of various groups of people. Utilization of nutrition

counseling to promote change will be covered.

HOME 5420 Family Intervention Models (3)  
A survey of selected family intervention and skill development models with opportunity for the student to study in depth an individual theoretical approach of his/her own choosing.

DELETE HOME 4334, 4335, Clinical Dietetics II (6,0)

DELETE HOME 4344, 4345, Clinical Dietetics III (12, 0)

NURS 2400 Introduction to Health Assessment (3)  
Two (2) classroom hours per week.  
Two (2) laboratory hours per week.  
Prerequisites: BIOL 2140, 2141; consent to enroll in clinical nursing; corequisites: BIOL 2150, 2151; NURS 2500, 2501  
An introductory course designed to assess and collect data concerning psychosocial and physical status of well adults.

NURS 2500 Nursing of Well Adults (3)  
Prerequisites: Consent to enroll in clinical nursing courses;  
Corequisites: NURS 2400, 2501; BIOL 2150, 2151  
Provides the beginning professional nursing student an opportunity to learn fundamental concepts related to promotion and maintenance of adult wellness.

NURS 2501 Practicum in Nursing of Well Adults (2)  
Six laboratory/clinical hours per week.  
Prerequisites: Consent to enroll in clinical nursing courses  
Corequisites: NURS 2400, 2500; BIOL 2150, 2151.  
Provides the beginning student an opportunity to apply fundamental concepts of health promotion and maintenance to well adults.

NURS 2600 Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (5)  
Prerequisites: NURS 2400, 2500, 2501; BIOL 2150; 2151;  
corequisites: NURS 2601; BIOL 2110, 2111.

Focuses on the nursing process for the care of adults experiencing minor deviations in health.

- NURS 2601 Practicum in Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Deviations from Wellness (2)  
Six clinical/laboratory hours per week.  
Prerequisites: NURS 2400, 2500, 2501; BIOL 2150, 2151.  
Corequisites: NURS 2600; BIOL 2110, 2111.  
Provides an opportunity to implement the Nursing Process for Adults with minor deviations from health.
- NURS 3050 Nursing Core I (2)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 3000; BIOL 2110, 2111; PSYC 3206; HOME 1103; or consent of instructor.  
Corequisites: NURS 3100, 3101 OR 3300, 3301.  
Builds upon previously learned concepts and provides additional theoretical bases for applying the nursing process in caring for individuals within families.
- NURS 3100 Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Health Stressors (5)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 3000; BIOL 2110, 2111, PSYC 3206, HOME 1103 or consent of instructor;  
corequisite: NURS 3101, 3050 (fall semester)  
Provides additional theoretical bases for applying the nursing process to the care of individuals within families experiencing illnesses of varying complexity.
- NURS 3101 Practicum in Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Health Stressors (5)  
Fifteen clinical hours per week  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 3000; BIOL 2110, 2111, PSYC 3206, HOME 1103 or consent of instructor;  
corequisites: NURS 3100, 3050 (fall semester)  
Provides opportunities for applying the nursing process to the care of individuals within families experiencing illnesses of varying complexity. Integration of previously learned and newly acquired knowledge and skills are utilized in the care of patients.
- NURS 3300 Nursing of the Childbearing and Childrearing Family (5)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 3000; PSYC 3206; BIOL 2110, 2111; HOME 1103; corequisites: NURS 3301, 3050 (fall semester).  
Provides opportunities for the student to build on previously learned concepts and to acquire additional theoretical bases for applying the nursing process with families during the childbearing and childrearing phases of the life cycle.
- NURS 3301 Practicum in Nursing of the Childbearing and Childrearing Family (5)  
Fifteen laboratory/clinical hours per week  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 3000; PSYC 3206; BIOL 2110, 2111; HOME 1103; Corequisites: NURS 3300, 3050 in fall  
Guided experiences in the application of the nursing process with regard to families during the childbearing and childrearing phases of the life cycle.

- NURS 4000 Family and Community Health Nursing (2)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4001, 4400, 4401 (exceptions must be approved by instructor), NURS 4050 (fall semester)  
Provides opportunities for the senior nursing student to synthesize knowledge of nursing practice and community health practice.
- NURS 4001 Practicum in Family and Community Health Nursing (3)  
Nine clinical/laboratory hours per week.  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4000, 4400, 4401 (Exceptions must be approved by instructor), NURS 4050 (fall semester).  
Students are assigned to official agencies where they utilize the nursing process in providing nursing care for a small number of families.
- NURS 4050 Nursing Core II (3)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4000, 4001, 4400, 4401, or NURS 4200, 4201, 4320.  
Provides a conceptual base for concurrent and subsequent courses on the senior level. Content relates to common themes in Community Health, Mental Health, and Leadership in Nursing.
- NURS 4200 Nursing Leadership (2)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4201, 4050 (fall semester)  
Provides a basis for developing leadership skills and management techniques with individuals and groups in a variety of health care settings.
- NURS 4201 Practicum in Nursing Leadership (5)  
Fifteen clinical/laboratory hours per week.  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4200, 4050 (fall semester)  
Provides opportunities for the student to further develop competencies in leadership skills and management techniques in a variety of health care settings.
- NURS 4400 Mental Health Nursing in the Community (2)  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4000, 4001, 4401, 4050 (fall semester)  
Provides a theoretical base on which to build skills necessary for caring for individuals/families with mental/emotional disorders.
- NURS 4401 Practicum in Mental Health Nursing in the Community (3)  
Nine clinical/laboratory hours per week.  
Prerequisites: All required nursing courses below 4000;  
corequisites: NURS 4000, 4001, 4400, 4050 (fall semester)  
Providing care to individuals, families and communities needing mental health promotion services and/or treatment of mental illness.
- DELETE NURS 2200, Introduction to the Process of Nursing (6)  
NURS 2201, Practicum in Introduction to the Process of Nursing (2)  
NURS 2300, Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Health Stressors I (6)  
NURS 2301, Practicum in Nursing of the Adult Adapting to Health Stressors (2)
