Attachment 5
Resale of Complimentary Copies of Textbooks
Whereas, The book store purchases used books from wholesalers for resale to students;

Whereas, These books sometimes include complimentary copies of textbooks given the faculty members free as examination copies and later bought by a wholesaler;

Whereas, The sale of such examination copies deprives the author of royalties and discourages the further distribution of examination copies; and

Whereas, The cost to the publisher of such not-for-sale copies is ultimately passed on to the student purchaser in the form of higher textbook prices; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Faculty Senate does hereby oppose the resale of complimentary textbooks;

Resolved, That the Faculty Senate does hereby oppose the presence of such book buyers and request that faculty members ask book buyers to show the "Permit to Solicit" required by University regulations; and, be it further

Resolved, That the Faculty Senate encourage the book store not to purchase not-for-sale copies of text books for resale to students; and

Resolved, That the Faculty Senate encourage faculty members to dispose of such books by giving them to students or returning them to the publisher or the publisher's representative.
