DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM AND RELATIONSHIP TO INSTITUTI	CONAL MISSION

The intent of the graduate nursing faculty is to redesign the graduate curriculum with a unifying theme of rural health nursing and with an additional focus of population aggregates as clients for the clinical majors. A third core course will be developed which explicates problems and issues in rural health care and rural health nursing content will be integrated throughout both the clinical practice and professional role sequences (see attached curriculum design table). Students will also be able select certain community-based sub-specialties within the existing clinical majors of Adult health, Parent-Child, and Psychiatric-mental health nursing as well as in a proposed community health major which reflect contemporary nursing practice fields. School health, occupational health, midwifery, gerontology and home health nursing as well as in a proposed community health major are prime examples of such focuses.

The proposed redesign (see schematic) is consonant with the University's educational and service missions and echoes the Division of Health Sciences' major commitment in rural health to seek "a better understanding of the health problems, concerns, and needs of the elderly, the poor, the underprivileged, and individuals in underserved communities." This new programmatic thrust addresses priorities in the School's vision statement and plan which identify "positively impacting the quality of care of its publics through effective nursing leadership for the community-atlarge", "use of its singular placement in a vast rural region which can serve as an ideal laboratory to test nursing interventions and to measure client outcomes" and "the development of options in rural community health and primary care in the graduate program" as targets for action.


### RATIONALE FOR PROGRAM ADDITION/DELETION/REDESIGN:

In order to better maximize its uniqueness, the School should emphasizes a theme of rural health nursing in its academic programming. The very nature of its geographic setting and demographic and epidemiologic contexts in eastern North Carolina make great the School's potential great to develop innovative and effective models and to prepare graduates for nursing practice in remote, disadvantaged and underserved communities in the rural South. This development would be particularly propitious at a time when national trends in health care delivery include a shift from acute care to primary prevention and health promotion; from hospital to community-based care. This refocusing should be preparatory to planning for possible future doctoral study in the field. Moreover, there are already seed resources in place since with an exceptional cadre of faculty in the clinical departments whose expertise, research, and interests are in the sub-specialty areas noted above. For instance, faculty members in occupational health, school health, women's health and home health have strong regional or national reputations. Such factors make for strong market to appeal potential students and to employing health agencies.
