Corrections to the Minutes of October 25, 1990:

Page 1, fourth paragraph, delete the sentence "Change the name of BIOL 1050/51 to General Biology instead of Principles of Biology.

In the last paragraph on page 1, amend the first sentence to read ...and a request that interdisciplinary courses not count toward General Education in an area requirement.

In the Catalog Copy, Delete the last line on page 1. The catalog should continue to read BIOL 1050. Principles of Biology.

Delete the first line on page 2. The catalog should continue to read BIOL 1051. Principles of Biology Laboratory.

Herb Carlton noted that a course which did not receive approval for the Women's Studies minor on Oct. 25, 1990 was listed in the notices on bulletin boards.

Gay Wilentz pointed out that the catalog does contain correct information on women's studies.

The minutes were approved as amended.

Minutes of November 8, 1990:

Professor Haney presented a request for revising the BFA and BA in Art, and to change the prerequisites for 5220. Shea moved approval as amended; Richards seconded; the motion passed.

Professor Ligon presented a request for approval of MKTG 4992 (International Marketing). Wilentz moved acceptance as amended, Wittman seconded. The motion passed.

Professor Bays presented a request to revise the BA and BS in Economics, to change 4030 to 3030, 3213 to 4214, 3740 to 4740, and to change the prerequisites for each. The 3213 change changes the BS in Urban and Regional Planning. Carlton moved acceptance, Wilentz seconded, and the motion passed.

Professors Zonn and Chestang presented a request for a new BS degree in Applied Geography. Richards moved acceptance as amended, Shea seconded. The motion passed.

The Committee was requested to reconsider the statement that appears on page 53 of the current Catalog on the "second or double" major. Discussion centered around alternate wording, and the meaning of the terms "double" and/or "second" major. With no resolution in sight, Richards moved to table the discussion; Shea seconded. The motion passed.

The Committee discussed a draft of a letter to Jim Joyce, Chair of the Faculty, from Frank Wondolowski, Chair of Credits Committee, Bill Grossnickle, Chair of university Curriculum Committee, and Gerhard Kalmus, Chair of General College Committee, in reference to the Writing Across the Curriculum Proposal. Shea moved the Committee endorse the draft with suggestions by the Committee included. Richards seconded. The motion passed.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30.
