| #96-32 | The University should provide scholarships and grants to sophomore-level and above students who have proven themselves academically at East Carolina University. The Student Scholarships, Fellowships, and Financial Aid Committee should be kept abreast annually of the awarding of these new scholarships and grants through a report from the Financial Aid office. |
| #96-33 | Revised Selection Procedures for Robert and Lina Mays and Robert L. Jones Alumni Distinguished Professor for Teaching Awards (attachment 2).   |
| #96-34 | Revised School of Allied Health Science's Unit Code of Operations (attachment 3).  |

The Faculty Senate also approved revised *Guidelines for Setting University Calendars* and forwarded the proposed principal features of a meaningful system of post-tenure review to the Faculty Officers to formulate the approved list of components for review of performance of tenured faculty into a list of features and report to the Faculty Senate on 5 November 1996. 
