Subject: Courses Cognated in General Education

The General Education Committee surveyed academic units regarding courses cognated in General Education, and found that most units were able to provide justification for their courses currently cognated.

Perceiving problems arising from excessive use of cognated courses, the General Education Committee has requested that Vice Chancellor Ringeisen advise the academic units seriously to consider eliminating all General Education cognate courses in their programs unless:
a) they are prerequisites for other courses in the unit's degree program,
b) they are needed for accreditation,
c) they are absolutely essential for the integrity of the program.

The moratorium on new cognates in General Education requested by the Committee while it studies the problem expires March 24 th, 1998. The Committee does not request an extension

Recently, we have asked the General Education Committee to formalize a review of general education cognates in all undergraduate curricula. This follows input received in relation to the development of articulation agreements and the follow-up to the external review of the office of Undergraduate Studies.

As the Committee begins its work on this important issue, we are asking for a moratorium on adding any general education cognates. This action will take place to allow the General Education Committee the opportunity to study the issue thoroughly. This request will not affect any course proposals presently being considered by the University Curriculum Committee for their scheduled 27 March 1997, meeting. This moratorium will be in effect until the Committee completes its work on 24 March 1998.

In the very near future, the General Education Committee will distribute a questionnaire pertaining to the number of general education cognates offered in your undergraduate curricula. You will be asked to state the reasons why the cognates are being used and whether there may be other ways to handle the need. It is our hope that information can be gathered and this issue adequately addressed during the Fall 1997, semester. The Committee has been asked to provide a report to the Faculty Senate no later than 24 March 1998.

Re: Review of Undergraduate Curricula
Date: December 15, 1997
At the November meeting of deans and directors we discussed two curriculum issues which I am asking that you bring to the attention of your faculty. The first involves the need for careful consideration of undergraduate degree requirements (both major and minor). Because of the inclusion of cognates, especially general education cognates in the major, the time to graduation may be extended for students who change majors. Many department chairs and deans are granting exceptions to degree requirements for such students, which benefits the students but calls into question the need to require those courses for which exceptions are granted.

I am asking you to request that appropriate faculty committees carefully review your undergraduate curricula to determine if there are general education courses that are currently cognated but need not be so. Particular attention should be focused on cognate courses that are not (1) required prerequisites for required major courses in the degree* or (2) courses specifically required for accreditation of the degree or licensure for graduates.

For courses that do not meet either of the above criteria for centrality to the degree, an option is to revise the degree requirements to indicate that the courses are "recommended cognates" or "recommended general education courses." (For an example of one curriculum that employs this wording, see 1997-98 undergraduate catalog, p. 123, BS IN PUBLIC HISTORY, Option 1: History in the Business World, 1. General education.) Although advisers routinely recommend courses that will enhance the preparation of departmental majors for the job market or for graduate school, including such information in the catalog assists advisers outside the department in guiding intended majors as they select their courses. Further, when students transfer from one major to another, "recommended" general education courses do not require retaking a course where the general education requirement has been met. Listing "not-essential-but-nice" courses as "recommended" is preferable to making numerous exceptions to the curriculum requirements printed in the catalog.

[^0]During the curriculum review, please ascertain that prerequisites for all courses continue to be appropriate and eliminate or revise, as needed, to maintain curricular coherence. Again, "recommended prerequisite" could be used if many exceptions are being granted to the listed prerequisite(s) for a course.

The second matter discussed at the meeting concerns zero credit courses. We need to verify that courses which carry zero credit are not utilizing university resources as we move to a new tuition structure in which students pay "by the credit hour" instead of in "credit hour blocks." Attachment B is a list of courses which have been identified as carrying no credit and which do not appear to be laboratories for which credit is incorporated with the lecture. Since UNC-GA has specified a system-wide credit conversion for graduate residency courses, they have been omitted from the list. If your departments have zero credit courses, please ask them to consider whether credit should be awarded for those courses because the students are requiring the expenditure of university resources. When we move to the new funding formula, the university will lose funding if we c $\phi$ ntinue to offer zero credit courses.

Addressing both of these issues may require curriculum action, which must follow established curriculum revision procedures. Any curriculum revisions that are approved by the Faculty Senate during this academic year will appear in the 1998-99 catalog. (The deadline for submission to the University Curriculum Committee for action during the 1997-98 academic year is March 1, 1998. The Graduate Curriculum Committee deadline is March 5, 1998.) If departments are unable to complete the curriculum review and submit curriculum revisions during this academic year, I will expect a report on the progress made and a projected time for completion of the review as part of the unit annual report in the late spring.
