General Education Committee Report to the Faculty Senate February 27, 2001

Pursuant to a request from the English Department that English 2700 ("Introduction to Language Studies"), English 2740 ("Language in the USA"), and English 3750 ("Introductory Linguistics") receive general education humanities credit, the General Education Committee proposes the following addition to the description of subject area courses generally fulfilling humanities credit on p. 57 of the current catalogue:

The phrase "Selected Linguistics Courses" be inserted after the item "Philosophy" on page 57 of the 2000-2001 Undergraduate Catalog at the bottom of the section headed "Humanities (GE:HU)" within the heading "Humanities and Fine Arts(GE:HU) (GE:FA) ... 10sh.

Contingent on adoption of this expanded language, the General Education Committee proposes that the three English courses in question receive General Education Humanities credit for the purposes of fulfilling General Education requirements for graduation.

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The Office of Undergraduate Studies is both an academic and an administrative unit consisting of the following offices and academic support programs: General College; Academic Transition Program; Office of Cooperative Education; Freshman Seminar; Academic Support Center; undecided, reconsidering, Prehealth, and prelegal special advisement; and transfer credit approval and processing. The office administers academic policies and procedures, coordinates academic advising, advocates for undergraduate education and promotes the effectiveness of general education, offers additional assistance and learning experiences to special populations, provides career-related experiences through cooperative education, and assumes other responsibilities concerning undergraduate education as delegated by the vice chancellor for academic affairs.

General education requirements are designed to engender a broad liberal arts base upon which to add the depth of study in the major. Some courses that carry general education credit are identified in the course listings using the following notation; however, there may be other courses that also carry general education credit. Courses in major prefix may not count toward general education.
