THE GREAT

SIOUX NATION!

An Ancient Indian prayer says.."The Creator Made The World...Come And See It!" It is acknowledged that this embodies much of the philosophy of the American Indian, certainly those of the seven tribes originally called the Dakota. The Teton Tribe of the Dakota moved into the plains in the late 1700's and within a century or less were recognized as the embodiment of the Plains Indian..the famous Sioux. The French originally coined this name from an Algonquian term.

By the late 19th century, invasion, resistance and retreat had become an accepted mode of existence between the Indian and the white man as the immigrant surge moved ever westward from the coastal settlements. Finally, following the Civil War, the frontier wrapped its coils around the Plains Indians. Basically, the story is no different from the penetration and destruction of Indian nations earlier and elsewhere. There were the enforced treaties made and immediately broken, the quarrels, the wars, the clarion call for extermination and the agonizingly long trek to the end of a dedicated way of life.

The plains wars are America's Iliad. Paced to the tempo of a wild Sioux charge, they constituted an epic poem composed of blood and valor. It is a poem that will outlive history and as with all epic poems, never quite dies.

The final stanzas were cast in Oklahoma Territory in the year 1868 with the defeat of a U.S. cavalry detachment under the command of Lt. Col. George Armstrong Custer. This was the first major Indian engagement for the dashing Civil War Brevet General and might well be called, "Custer's First Stand."

The plains wars reached their climax after the discovery of gold in the Black Hills in 1874. The Sioux had to be persuaded to sell out the Black Hills that had been guaranteed them by a previous treaty. This was accomplished only by many columns of troops and many scouts, Pawnees, Crows, and Shoshones who joined the white soldiers to fight their old enemies of the plains.

In a great council, the Sioux voted an alliance to drive the white men from the Hills. The alliance came under the command of two powerful and very different personalities, Tatanka Yotanka, Sitting Buffalo, known to Americans as Sitting Bull, and an Oglala Warrior, famed for his recklessness and bravery...Crazy Horse. Called by his people "The Strange Man", Crazy Horse was from the beginning, a free-spirited visionary. Born in 1842 somewhere along Rapid Creek in the Black Hills, he was assassinated while under protective custody at the age of 35. His remains rest today somewhere in these "Wild Places," as yet undiscovered by probing historians and known only to the "Old Ones" who laid his martyred body to rest.

In June of 1876, this encampment of unpersuaded Sioux was discovered among the wild-plum and crab-apple blossoms in the valley of the Rosebud Creek in southern Montana by General George Crook and a thousand troopers. In the battle that ensued, Crook was forced to limp back to his base of supplies. Eight days later, the Indians had moved across the ridge to the Little Big Horn where they were attacked on a Sunday afternoon by a regiment of cavalry. In leading the resistance to the attack, it was Crazy Horse who rallied his warriors with the cry, "Today is a good day to fight..today is a good day to die." This regiment was the 7th U. S. Cavalry under the command of George Armstrong Custer.

This was, however, but the prologue to the epilogue. The Custer defeat was, in effect, the end of the wars of the plains and Crazy Horse and Sitting Bull lost by winning. The ending went on and on like the dying wail of a death song, both great leaders perishing in the treachery of ignorable murder.

Turned into bedraggled, scurrying creatures rather like fugitive convicts, this noble nation was turned over to jailers who knew how to handle tough prisoners. It was at this time, when the glory and nobility had vanished that the greatest feats of gallantry occurred, all the greater in that they were utterly hopeless. The heritage, dignity and dedication of the great Sioux nation continues to burn in the eternal flame fed by the conviction that..."The Creator Made The World...Come And See It!"








CENTRAL HILLS

Dinosaur Park, sitting astride skyline ridge in the heart of the city with life-size recreations of giant dinosaurs from the mesazoic era..the Sioux Museum in Halley Park is the world's most complete museum of its type..Museum of Geology at the School of Mines is famous for its prehistoric life and mineral exhibits..the State Fish Hatchery with millions of trout specimens in its many pools, and Storybook Island, a youngster's fairyland where all of the Mother Goose characters come to life. All of these attractions are free to the family. Rapid City, of course, abounds in fine dining, dancing and after-dark entertainment spots. The Sheraton-Johnson and Harney hotels are among the most historic in the city and fine motels designed for luxury western living bedeck every section of Rapid City.

South on Rushmore Road, you'll want to enjoy exciting jungle tours at **Reptile Gardens** and thrill to the live porpoise and scuba diving shows presented every day from 8 AM at internationally famous **Marine Land**...Be sure to visit **Rockerville**, a real ghost town come to life where you cheer and applaud the heroine, jeer and throw peanuts at the villian during a delightful evening of live entertainment at the **Mellerdrammer Theatre**...At **Keystone**, the old west comes alive when you ride the sensational **1880 Train** which takes you through beautifully scenic country to **Hill City**...At Hill City, you can enjoy western trail rides while camping at **Rafter J-Bar Ranch**, and art lovers will thrill at **Eng's Wood Sculpture Studio**...a "must" for all Black Hills visitors is, of course, a trip to **Mount Rushmore**, the Shrine of Democracy, with its gift center, dining rooms, and the night time ceremony of the lights..The National Memorial was carved by the world-renowned Gutzon Borglum beginning in 1927 and completed by his son, Lincoln Borglum in 1941. The amazing likenesses of our four great Presidents are carved in proportion to men 465 feet tall and can be glimpsed through the Hills at distances 60 miles away.

Camping spots abound, with caves to investigate and mine shafts to explore. Tunnels and pigtail bridges add to the scenic drives and dining is a pleasure at Pactola Lodge Supper Club, Legion Lake or the Game Lodge where buffalo is standard fare on the menu. Sylvan Lake, Rochford, Silver City near Whispering Pines Camp Ground and the Needles Drive should not be missed...every curve in the road brings a thrill for the camera fan.

THE NORTHERN HILLS

Sturgis - Deadwood - Lead - Spearfish

A short drive north from Hot Springs brings you to the friendly communities of Sturgis, Deadwood, Lead and Spearfish. Trailer Camps, Motels, Hotels and fine dining locations abound in this scenic area of ponderosa clad peaks, bubbling trout streams and phantom mines and ghost towns.

Sturgis, at the foot of fabled Bear Butte, is the heart of the rangeland...Bear Butte State Park is a sacred Indian shrine, boasting a visitor's center, picnic and camping area and buffalo herd....Ft. Meade, with its original buildings still in use, is a treasure-trove of history. Major Reno was arrested here, the 7th Cavalry camped on its grounds and for many years, the horse Comanche, only survivor of the Custer battle, was stabled here.

Deadwood, one of the most fabulous cities of the old West, was born with the discovery of gold in the Black Hills...Bawdy, brawling and brash, Deadwood is the epitome of the old frontier town with its gunmen, gamblers and 1870 "go-go" girls..Mount Moriah Cemetery overlooking Deadwood from boot hill contains the final remains of both Wild Bill Hickok and Calamity Jane...Visit the Chinese tunnels built by coolie railroad labor in the catacombs underneath Deadwood City...The Franklin Hotel dating back to the days of the great Deadwood fire, provides visitors with comfortable accommodations in the gracious style of the '90s...See the saloons where Poker Alice, Potato Creek Johnny and Preacher Joe were familiar figures....where Wild Bill Hickok was shot in the back by Jack McCall, while holding the famous "Dead Man's Hand" of Aces and Eights...this means a visit to Old Style Saloon No. 10, the Buffalo Bar, the Bodega Cafe & Lounge where the street capture and hanging trial of Jack McCall begins each night...Deadwood is also the home of one of the Old West's most famous celebrations, "Days of '76" held in August of each year...Adams Museum is a Deadwood "must".

Central City, a very much "alive" ghost town lies just west of Deadwood where you'll find the superb dining and wining rendezvous, Turgeon's Supper Club & Lounge...

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
