

Order of Events PRELIMINARY MUSIC BY BAND

- 1. The Commanding Officer meets the Commandant at the side.
- 2. The Commanding Officer reports to the Commandant that all is in readiness for commissioning ceremony.
- 3. The Commandant and party proceed to Quarterdeck and the Commandant orders Bugler to sound ATTENTION.
- 4. The Commandant refers to the directive from the Navy Department for commissioning the ship.
- 5. The Commandant directs the Commanding Officer to issue necessary orders for all hands to face FORWARD.
- 6. The Commardant orders "SOUND COLORS".

 National Anthem played by band, National Ensign, Jack hoisted and commission pennant broken. Admiral's flag replaces commission pennant immediately, if desired.
- 7. The Commanding Officer faces crew to front.
- 8. The Commandant asks Chaplain to offer invocation.
- 9. The Commandant makes brief address and turns ship over to the Commanding Officer.
- 10. The Commanding Officer (facing crew), reads his orders to command and assumes command.
- 11. The Commanding Officer directs "SET THE WATCH".
- 12. Presentation of Yard representatives with Co-op Gift.
- 13. Congratulations The Commandant may inspect ship The Commandant leaves ship Honors may be rendered.

U. S. S. Hopping

The U. S. S. HOPPING is named in honor of Lieutenant Commander HALLSTED L. HOPPING, U. S. N., and is the first destroyer to be so named.

Lieutenant Commander HOPPING was born in New York City, September 2, 1902. He was appointed to the Naval Academy from the Nineteenth District of New York in 1920 and was graduated and commissioned Ensign in 1924. He was advanced to Lieutenant (jg) in 1927, Lieutenant in 1932 and Lieutenant Commander in 1938.

After graduation he served on the U. S. S. RICHMOND for two years and, in August, 1926, reported to the Naval Air Station, Pensacola, Florida, for flight training, upon completion of that course in November, 1927, he served in the Aircraft Squadrons, Scouting Fleet, until May, 1930, when he reported to the Naval Air Station, Coco Solo, Canal Zone, in August 1932, he was transferred to the Fleet Air Base, Coco Solo. He was under postgraduate instruction in general line duties at the Naval Academy from May, 1933, to May, 1934, when he joined the U. S. S. LANGLEY. In May 1936, he was transferred to the U. S. S. RANGER and, later, to the U. S. S. NEW ORLEANS. In June, 1937, he reported as Officer in Command of the Naval Reserve Aviation Base, Minneapolis, Minnesota. He was detached from that duty in November, 1938, and served at the Naval Air Station, San Diego, California, until June 1939, when he assumed command of a Scouting Squadron attached to a Carrier.

Lieutenant Commander HOPPING was killed in enemy action of February 1, 1942. The following letter of commendation was awarded him posthumously:

"For distinguished service in line of his profession as Commanding Officer of a Scouting Squadron during the operations of United States Forces against enemy land bases. Lieutenant Commander HOPPING led his squadron from an Aircraft Carrier in an air attack on Enemy land bases. Despite poor visibility due to semi-darkness, as well as fighter opposition and heavy anti-aircraft fire, the attack was made in a most effective manner which resulted in considerable loss to the enemy, although it also resulted in the loss of Lieutenant Commander HOPPING'S life when his plane was shot down. For your praiseworthy conduct on this occasion, you are hereby commended."
