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
### EAST CAROLINA TEACHERS TRAINING SCHOOL

From the first it has been an established policy of The Training School to offer courses of study to help the teacher who is actively engaged in the work, as well as courses of study to help the inexperienced to become efficient. Every course offered by this school is intended to help the student to become a more efficient teacher. The Training School is a professional school for teachers.

The calendar year is divided into four terms, any three of which may make a school year. The Spring and Summer Terms are on the same basis as the other terms. This means that the entire school plant is in full operation in the summer just as it is from September to June, and every opportunity is given to those students who attend the Summer Term that the school is able to offer at any other term.

#### COURSES OF STUDY

After five years experience with summer terms, we are sure the following courses of study will meet the demands of most of the students who attend this school. If they do not meet your needs, write us at once, and if possible we will provide for you.

Nore-Provision will be made whereby all students who have not previously had School Management may take it in addition to the other work of the Summer Term. This does not apply to students taking the Academic Courses. The full courses E, F, G and H, each make a year's work. When three terms are completed in any course the student is given credit for one year's work.

E1, E2, E3 is One Year Course A in catalogue.

F1, F2, F3 is One Year Course B in catalogue.

G1, G2, G3 is a course for students who have received the diploma of this school.

H1, H2, H3 is a course for students who have received this school's certificate for completing either of the One Year Courses.

A Course prepares for B work.

B and H Courses prepare for C work.

C Course prepares for D work.

When the full course E or F is completed the student will be given the school's certificate.

When course D is completed the student will be awarded the diploma of the school.

Students who have done work equivalent to a four years high school course, except in foreign languages, should take C work. Students without high school scholarship but with some teaching experience, should take E work. Students who wish to become primary teachers should take F1 work. Students without high school scholarship and without teaching experience should select one of the F courses. Students who have received the school's diploma should take G1 work. Students who have received the school's certificate should take H1 work.

If you do not find in the courses offered just what you need, write to us and make your needs clear. If possible, we will give you what you want, for it is the purpose of this school to offer the teachers of our State those studies that will help them to become the most efficient teachers possible. The teachers of North Carolina have a right to demand the best there is, and this school intends to meet that demand. We will do for you all that the funds at our disposal will permit.

In filling in your application, be sure to designate what course you wish to take. Write the name of the course after the question, "Which course or group do you wish to take?" The names of the courses offered are: A1, B1, C1, D1, E1, E2, E3, F1, F2, F3, G1, G2, G3, H1, H2 and H3.

#### INFIRMARY

The school infirmary is kept open for the Summer Term just as it is for any other term. A medical and infirmary fee of \$1.00 is charged. This fee covers all expenses for medical attention, including the services of the school physician, the services of the nurse, and the use of the infirmary, but does not include the cost of filling prescriptions.

#### BOOKS

The school will furnish textbooks to all who attend the Summer Term. For this the small fee of \$1.50 is charged.

Students may furnish their own books and not pay the book fee. It will be economy, however, to rent the books. The school will sell you books at cost.

#### LIBRARY

The school has a good pedagogical and reference library of 1,850 bound volumes, and many magazines and newspapers.

These expenses apply only to those students living in the

dormitories. All others pay only the registration fee and the book fee. There will be no reduction in the *fees*. Board, room, light and laundry, \$12.50 for four weeks, may be paid by the month.

#### STUDENT'S OUTFIT

Each student who lives in the dormitories is expected to bring for her own use the following articles: Two pairs of sheets, one pair of blankets, two counterpanes (only single beds are used), two pillow cases, six towels, six table napkins.

#### FULL TERM STUDENTS

Students who wish to spend eight weeks will be given rooms in the dormitories in preference to shorter term students. Rooms will not be reserved in the dormitories longer than June 18th, and then only upon request.

#### TERM CREDITS

Students who wish to get credit for the term's work must be present seven consecutive weeks. If you register later than June 22 you cannot get credit for the work of the term.

#### NEW COURSES

The school is offering this summer, for the first time, Course G which is prepared especially for former students of the school who now hold the school's diploma, and Course H for students who have received a certificate for the completion of either of our One Year Courses. Course H prepares for C work.

#### THE MODEL SCHOOL

It is our purpose to maintain classes in the Model School during the summer so that all students in The Training School for the Summer Term may observe actual class work and see how the principles of teaching are applied by experienced and skilful teachers.

#### **COUNTY INSTITUTES**

The State law provides that students who attend the Summer Term of The Training School shall not be required to attend a County Institute.
