EAST CAROLINA TEACHERS TRAINING SCHOOL

The East Carolina Teachers Training School is a professional school for teachers. Every course offered by this school is intended to help the student to become a more efficient teacher.

The calendar year is divided into four terms, any three of which make a school year. The Summer Term is on the same basis as the other terms. The entire school plant is in full operation, and every opportunity is given to the students who attend the Summer Term that the school is able to offer at any other term.

NOTE.—Provision will be made for all students who have not previously had School Management and School Law to take it in addition to the other work of the Summer Term. This, however, does not apply to students taking either of the Academic Courses.

EXPLANATION OF COURSES

The full courses *F*, *C*, *G*, and *H*, each make a year's work. When three terms are completed in any course the student is given credit for one year's work.

F1, *F2*, *F3* is One-Year Course *F* in catalogue.

G1, *G2*, *G3* is a course for students who have received the diploma of this school.

H1, *H2*, *H3* is a course for students who have received this school's certificate for completing the One-Year Course.

A Course prepares for *B* work.

B and *H* Courses prepare for *C* work.

The *C* Course prepares for our regular senior work.

When the full course *F* is completed the student will be given the school's certificate.

Students who have done work equivalent to a four years high school course, except in foreign languages, should take *C* work. Students who wish to become primary teachers should take *F1* work. Students without high school scholarship should select Course *A1*, *B1*, or one of the *F* courses. Students who have received the school's diploma should take *G1* work. Students who have received the school's certificate should take *H1* work.

If you do not find in the courses offered just what you need, write to us and make your needs clear. If possible, we will give you what you should have, for it is the purpose of this school to offer the teachers of our State those studies that will

help them to become most efficient. The teachers of North Carolina have a right to demand the best there is, and this school intends to meet that demand. We will do for you all that the funds at our disposal will permit.

In filling in your application for admission (see last leaf of this bulletin), *be sure to designate what course you wish to take.* Write the name of the course after the question, "Which course do you wish to take?" The names of the courses offered are: *A1, B1, C1, C2, C3, F1, F2, F3, G1, G2, G3, H1, H2, and H3.*

INFIRMARY

The school infirmary is kept open for the Summer Term just as it is for any other term. Dormitory students have the full benefit of the infirmary in case of sickness. This includes the services of the school physician, the attention of the nurse, and the use of the infirmary, but does not include the cost of filling prescriptions.

BOOKS

The school furnishes text-books to the Summer Term students. The school also sells text-books to the students at cost.

LIBRARY

The school has a well selected pedagogical and reference library. A good collection of standard fiction and many bulletins, magazines, and newspapers are available to all students.

These expenses apply to those students who live in the dormitories and are for the entire term of eight weeks. If the dormitory students prefer to pay by the month, the first payment is \$20 (the fee of \$5 and \$15 for board, room etc., for four weeks) due June 10th. The last month's payment is \$15, due July 8th.

Those students who do not live in the dormitories pay the registration fee (\$5).

The *fee* is payable on the day of registration, and there is no reduction in this fee.

STUDENT'S OUTFIT

Each student who lives in one of the dormitories is expected to bring for her own use the following articles: Two pairs of sheets, one pair of blankets, two counterpanes (only single beds are used), two pillowcases, six towels, six table napkins.

RESERVATION OF ROOMS

Students who wish to spend eight weeks will be given rooms in the dormitories in preference to those who wish to stay only a part of the term. Rooms in the dormitories will not be reserved longer than June 12th, and then only upon a written request.

TERM CREDITS

Students who wish to get school credit for the term's work must be present seven consecutive weeks and take the examinations at the close of the term. If you register later than June 17th, you cannot get credit for the work of the term.

SPECIAL COURSES

The school is offering again this summer *Course G*, which is prepared especially for former students of the school who now hold the school's diploma, and *Course H* for students who have received a certificate for the completion of our One-Year Course. *Course H* prepares for *C* work.

MUSIC—PIANO

There is a growing demand in the country districts for teachers who can teach Instrumental Music in connection with the regular school work. In order to meet this demand and in recognition of the value of music in making the school the centre of the social life of the community, this school is offering the Summer Term students special lessons in piano.

The tuition is \$10 for the term of eight weeks. This includes the use of piano for practice.

THE MODEL SCHOOL

Classes of children are taught in the Model School during the summer, and all students in the Training School for the Summer Term may observe actual class work and see how the principles of teaching are applied by experienced and skillful teachers.

COUNTY INSTITUTES

The State law provides that students who attend the Summer Term of the Training School shall not be required to attend a County Institute.
