She departed this life at the age of 30 years, having been for eight or ten years of that time a professor of Christianity and a member of the Methodist Protestant Church. She was diffident and retiring in her manners, warm, ardent and affectionate towards her friends. She lingered under her disease about six weeks; her sufferings at times, both of body and mind, were very severe.
