"Buckingham Palace," Haunt Of College Males

If you ever happen to call the Servicemen's Home at 313 West 5th Street and someone answers the phone with "Buckingham palace, King George speaking," then you have the right number.

The Servicemen's Home is the 3-story brick building located across the street from the bus station. For approximately four years now, while the one men's dormitory, Wilson Hall, has been overcrowded, the Servicemen's Home has been a favorite haven for male students of East Carolina.

Served 46,000 During War - The steam-heated home is leased by the Salvation Army, and room is provided on the first floor for approximately twenty servicemen where they may stay over the weekends.

During the war years, when the home was operated by "Mom" Horn, Mrs. John Horn of Greenville, it was a home for servicemen only. According to the very complete and accurate records which "Mom" kept, 46,000 servicemen slept there during the war.

Many Prefer Servicemen's Home - Many of the men who live in the Servicemen's Home have been there for three years or more and would hardly move if they could live in the school dormitory free of charge.

There are several reasons why the Servicemen's Home has proved so popular to the men staying there. As for having clothes cleaned, there is little trouble in that respect. The Home is the only off-campus place where the college laundry picks up laundry.

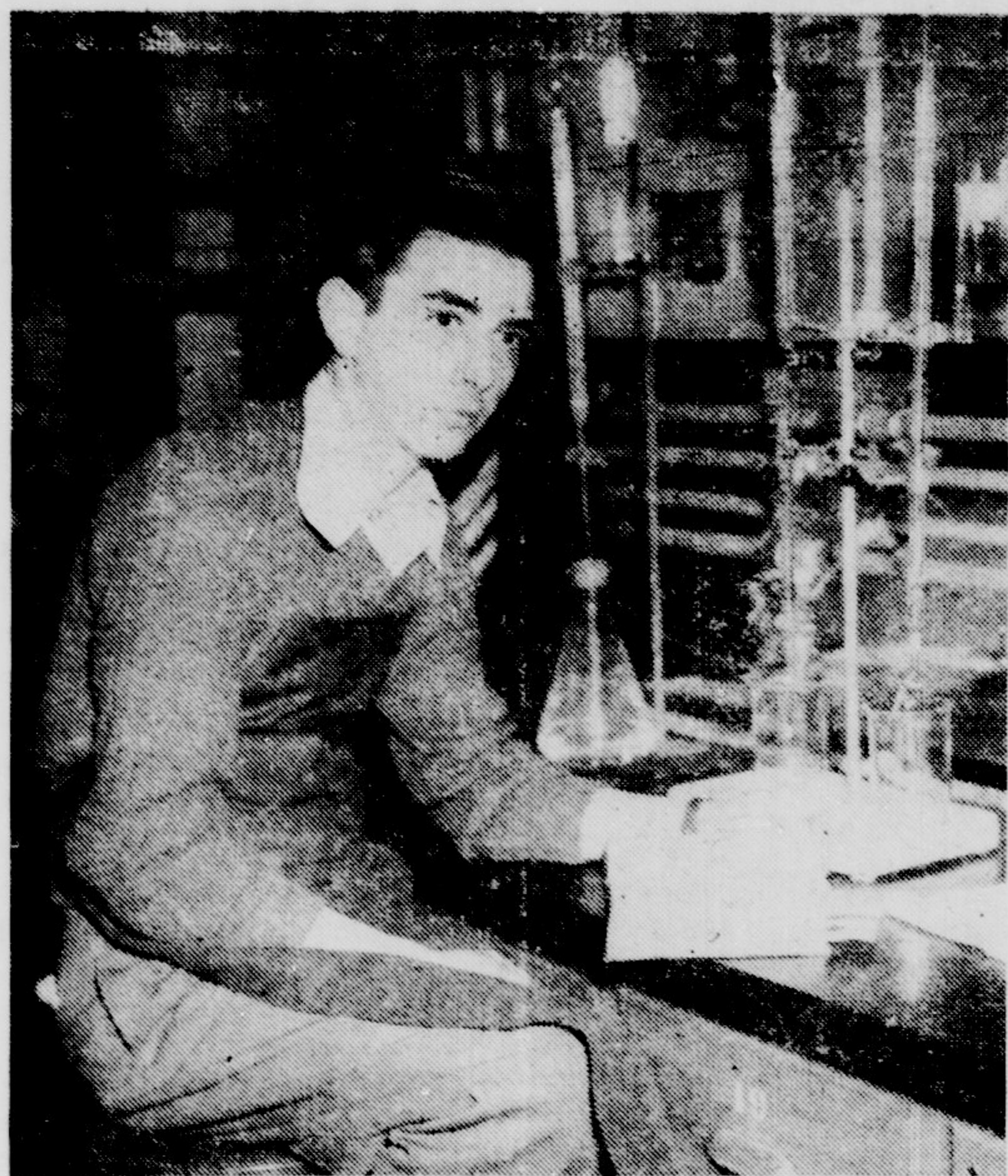

AAUW To Hold Game Tourney For Foreign Scholarship Fund

A game tournament to raise money for the foreign study Fellowship fund of the American Association of University Women and to begin a local scholarship fund for foreign study by a student for East Carolina, will be held Monday evening by the Greenville AAUW. The tournament will begin in the north dining hall at the college at 8 o'clock.

Educating for peace and international understanding, members of the organization believe, will be greatly facilitated by the growing exchange of students among different nations of the world. Realizing that grants for foreign study, by provision of the Fulbright Act and through other established procedures, can be awarded to only a limited number of persons, the Greenville group is interested in extending the program of foreign study to include an increasing number of students.

To Send Student

While supporting the national Fellowship fund, as in the past, the local branch is particularly anxious this year to contribute toward sending a student from East Carolina to study abroad at some time in the future. The project has been encouraged by the beneficial effect of hav-

ing foreign students in attendance at the college here, this being felt especially in recent years. At the suggestion of James L. Fleming, director of the foreign language department, who handled arrangements through the Institute of International Education, East Carolina has during the past two years awarded scholarships to two foreign students, who have assisted in the foreign language department and done graduate study in several departments of the college. Thus Miss Jacqueline Meziat-Belouze, of Algiers, attended East Carolina last year and this year Srta Paloma Lopez, Alarcon, born in Madrid, Spain, and now a resident of Havana, Cuba, is working and studying on the campus here. The Greenville AAUW would like to have a student from East Carolina representing his college and his people in another land, and enjoying the broadening experiences which residing and studying abroad might afford.
